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

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Editor's Note: *We reached out to Bill Lennox about the planning we were doing for the CASSOC spring meeting. Bill graciously replied with the following which, while we're sharing it here, we hope he can add to during the actual meeting.*

I am Bill Lennox a Board member of Clan MacFarlane Worldwide. My passion is to share the rich history of not only Clan MacFarlane but of others clans as well. To that end I share a rich history with Clan Buchannan, Clan Bruce, and Clan Galbreath. As I attend highland games I go to their respective tents greeting them sharing our mutual history. I am always welcomed into their tents. I find there are similarities among all of the clan tents. Below I give you my perspective.

As I have attended many highland games and social events I have found the common thread is family and friendship. Connecting and/or reconnecting with fellow clansmen and meeting new members of the clan and the septs.

One of the most enjoyable aspects I enjoy in hosting and attending highland games and social events is sharing the history of the clan with those who do not know what our clan is about. Also exchanging history with other clans that share a common history. Learning and gaining new insight into the mutual history we as Scot's share. Which is in my opinion is unique to our Scottish culture.

Preparation is key!

I host tents at highland games for Clan MacFarlane. A banner above the tent to show where our tent is located. Inside the tent tables are arranged to be inviting to visitors. We want them to feel welcome to step inside and visit. Pictures of our clan history, books, and maps to answer the many questions that arise. Chairs are placed around the tent to invite members and guests to stay and simply visit. A wee bit of Scottish hospitality is offered. A quest register i.e. sign in book to record our guest visits and at the end of the games the list is forwarded to our membership chair for follow up with a letter thanking them for stopping by. New members are contacted and welcomed into our clan.

Everyone who comes to a highland games or social event has expectations. Especially those who are coming for the first time. I would say in my experience most of the time we meet and even exceed quest expectations. Our members great and have robust conversations with everyone who visits. There are occasions when we simply do not have enough information to answer questions. However, emails are exchanged and attempts are made to respond at a later time.

One thing we do that I think is a highlight to a visitor is extending an invitation to join us in marching in the parade of Tartan's at the opening ceremony. It is to them a time to express their pride in the clan and to feel welcomed into the clan.

Our goals with the road show is many fold.

1. To provide recognition and representation to each of our members at an event so that if you can't attend, there's still a way for the public to find you and connect to you.
2. To attend every games/festival members event in some way.
3. To have representation for CASSOC across as much of Canada as possible

We'll be setting up either a rack display or our three 8' by 5' banners with a poster for each member. The rack display, shown below, has worked very well but is not easy to travel with for long distances. For games where the rack display won't work, we'll use the large banner configuration that worked

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well in Ottawa for the Scottish Society of Ottawa's Hogman'Eh last year.

An exceptional solution to attending our most western member, The Red Deer Highland Games, has been worked out for this year. We just can't do the travel in time between Moncton on June 1th and Red Deer on June 24th so we'll be sending out a large feather banner, a new style binder/book with pages similar to the posters and a set of CASSOC handout cards. Kirstin Hunter, a member of CASSOC's board of directors will be handling the setup of this at Red Deer. We will be working out how to do something similar for our member the Cobourg Scottish Festival & Highland Games on June 17th which conflicts with the same weekend dates as the Greater Moncton Highland Games. Please come see us at any of the events and sign the visitor log.

If your group is attending an event not listed above and you'd like to have the same setup as we're doing for Red Deer, please contact us at roadshow@scotscanada.ca. We'll need about 4 weeks advance notice to produce and ship you the materials.

If you have material that you'd like to have available to be handed out at a road show event but you're not attending then let us know and we'll arrange some way for us to have on the CASSOC table. Please feel free to step with help for CASSOC's representation at any event or opportunity.

We're always open to your ideas and suggestions on how to improve initiatives such as these. Please reach out and/or share with us at the upcoming Spring meeting forum on Highland Games and Festival attendance.

Clans and Scottish Societies of Canada Tartan Registration

The process we began last spring for having a tartan for CASSOC that is its own has been completed. To recap, at the Spring meeting last year we undertook a CASSOC tartan design challenge hosted by Emily Redman of ScotlandShop. The result was four excellent candidates which we then submitted to the membership as an online poll for selection.

The resulting winner was then formally adopted as the official CASSOC tartan by an amendment to our bylaws. A preliminary check for similarity with existing designs was done and there did not appear to be a conflict so the next step was registration with the Scottish Register of Tartans. Seemed simple enough once working through the wording and nuances of the application form. However here is response we received.

"Dear William,

Thank you for your application to register the Clans and Scottish Societies of Canada tartan.

Unfortunately, the design has been deemed to be too similar to the 'Nicolson of Lewis' tartan already on our register so we would not be able to proceed with the application in its current form.

Would you like to make some changes, either by changing the size of the stripes and order of the colours, or by including other colours, and send us a revised design? Alternatively, if you do not wish to make changes to your design then we can send you a refund of the registration fee at this stage.

We look forward to hearing from you.

Best wishes, Sarah - Scottish Register of Tartans"

What immediately came to mind when reading this was, as advised in the Hitchhiker's Guide, "don't panic".

After a discussion with Emily about resubmission strategy, some tweaks were made to the design based upon the recommendation above. The key concern, we believe, with the Tartan Register was that matching thread count ratios and basic colours. Thus the following changes were made: The white stripe at the center of the sett was replaced with a black-lined yellow stripe in order to add a colour; The white stripe at the edge of the sett had black borders put on it to alter thread count; The symmetrical aspect of the green and blue stripes was adjusted to have a two thread black stripe added to the blue side in order to have a slight asymmetry different from the symmetry of the Nicholson of Lewis design. Lastly in resubmitting we heeded Emily's excellent advice to confirm what, if any, design conflict issues there would be with the new version.

The end result was the acceptance and receipt of the official registration as shown on the next page. The official registration information can be viewed on the Tartan Register's site [here](#) or click on the certificate of registration on the next page.

A Short History

It is unknown exactly when the name Watson was introduced to Scotland, but we start to see it in records dating back to the 14th century. The name is derived from Wat, the diminutive form of Walter, an Old German name meaning “mighty warrior” or “ruler of the army”. Two potential routes by which the name Walter entered the British Isles are either

with Normans in the form of Gaultier or with Dutch or Flemish traders in the form of Walter or Wouter.

In old times, the name appears to have been primarily concentrated around the south east of Scotland and the north east of England. Although not a clan in the traditional highland sense, the Watsons are legally recognised by the Court of the Lord Lyon as an armigerous clan, with the last registered chief being James Watson of Saughton, whose arms were matriculated in 1818. We also have a contemporary account from 1794 stating that his father, Charles Watson of Saughton, was chief of the name in Scotland, although to date we have been unable to locate any records to validate this. James’s last surviving heir, his daughter Helen, married the Lord Aberdour, a member of the Douglas family who became the 18th Earl of Morton. The Douglas have expressed that they are not interested in taking up the title of Chief of Clan Watson and so the chiefship currently lies dormant while the society searches for other hereditary heirs.

Clusters of prominent Watsons are found in several key cities in Scotland from the early to mid-16th century onwards. They are nearly all successful merchants and many of them held civic positions such as bailies and provosts. We are aware of links between some of these clusters – for example, the Watsons of Damhead and Muirhouse were descended from the Watsons of Saughton – and see hints that other clusters were also connected to the Saughtons. Our current working assumption is that the Watsons built a reasonably successful trading and political empire that spread to key cities in Scotland, to London, and as far afield as the Caribbean as the British Empire expanded.

It is considered improbable that the Watson chiefs had a sizeable clan, even though they were recognised as chief of the Watson name in Scotland. Y-DNA evidence confirms our assumption that, as a

patronymic name, the name Watson arose independently in multiple locations across Scotland and England.

The Watsons are considered to be septs of both Clan Buchanan and Clan Forbes. The link to the Buchanans is likely due to a cadet branch of the Buchanans of Leny that became known as the MacWatties, although we do find evidence of prominent Watsons and Buchanans mixing in the same circles in Dunbartonshire. Many folk of the name Watt lived in and around the ancient lands of the Forbeses in Aberdeenshire, which is a possible root of the association of the Watson name with that of Forbes.

The current Clan Watson Society is a somewhat informal initiative that commenced in 2004 with the aim of building links between Watsons (and name variants) across the world to enable collaborative research and knowledge sharing and to develop a sense of community. We welcome all those who were born or married into any of the name variants, or anyone with an interest in our research to sign up on the website or our Facebook group or to follow us on Instagram. We now have several hundred members across the world and are currently seeing rapid growth and are now in the process of formalising the society.

President's Message

When October comes with crisp mornings and bright fall colors, around Atlanta it means the Stone Mountain Highland Games are coming. Lots of old and new friends gather for this event put together by an amazing group of volunteers. This year they even moved the hospitality tent closer to the Clan Bell tent

Earlier this year, Clan MacMillan became aware of my paper debunking their arguments for Bell as a sept and were so embarrassed that they removed these arguments from their website without comment. Avoiding reason altogether, Clan MacMillan now just lists Bell as a sept with no basis at all.

The 2022 Guest of Honor at Stone Mountain was Donald MacLaren of MacLaren and Acheslkinne, who is also the Convenor of the Standing Council of Scottish Chiefs since 2018. There was also a lecture scheduled at the host Donald MacLaren, Convenor hotel on clans and septs by of the Standing Council of Graeme Mackenzie, who is a Scottish Chiefs genealogist promoting the ridiculous claim that MacMillan has a sept name Bell. Needless to say, I had a few questions I was hoping Mr. MacKenzie would answer.

During Mr. MacKenzie's lecture, Donald MacLaren made a comment from the audience noting that some chiefs think it enhances their importance to have a long list of sept names. It was obvious he thought this was misleading and something that Scottish chiefs did not need to do. I then had the opportunity to ask Mr. MacKenzie what reason there was for MacMillan to continue claiming Bell as a sept. He said a church scribe in the Highlands changed Scots Gaelic names in the parish rolls; in the case of the McMillans, the people who had a MacMillan sept name of MacIllvoyle were later called Bell. When I asked after the presentation about why other Gaelic names, like MacMillan, were not also changed, he had no answer. To my follow-up question, Mr. MacKenzie could not explain why people whose surname was summarily changed would just accept a new surname.

My questions were based on my research into the background of Clan MacMillan claiming Bell as a sept. It seems that around the time of the Battle of Culloden in 1746, there was a bitter dispute within Clan MacMillan. Only one Bell mention is found in parish records just before Culloden; after Culloden, the numbers of Bell names increased dramatically as the McIllvoyle names disappeared. Clan MacMillan attempts to explain the sudden appearance in MacMillan territory of the Bell name as the deliberate policy of a church scribe attempting to change MacIllvoyle to Bell. This MacMillan theory obliges others to believe that 100% of an entire group of Scots would suddenly agree to change their name for no discernable reason. In my opinion, an explanation of a dispute leading to total rejection by these Bells explains the name change very well. It even explains eliminating one Gaelic surname, while not eliminating MacMillan and other Gaelic surnames.

I was glad to actually hear directly from Mr. MacKenzie his explanation (even if that explanation was illogical and contrary to known facts) instead of having to assume an explanation for their insistence

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on Bell as a sept of MacMillan. We agreed to disagree and to remain friends. This claim continues to be misleading, and it is apparent to me that MacMillans want Bell as their largest sept to increase their numbers and attach Bell accomplishment to their MacMillan name.

Later during the Games, I was able to speak at length with Convenor Donald MacLaren and to suggest that the Standing Council of Scottish Chiefs adopt a list of disputed sept claims. It was apparent that Mr. MacLaren had thought about this topic at length and identified various definitions and clarifications that would require a lot of work to develop. Mr. MacLaren's experience as a diplomat to the UK in Berlin, Moscow, Caracas, and Kiev, and as Her Majesty's Ambassador in Tbilisi, Georgia showed in his thoughtful discussion and made it a pleasure to meet him.

We have made progress in debunking the MacMillan sept claim, and this may help other clans who likewise had their name claimed as a sept by another clan.

Clan of the Bells - Scottish Genealogy Resources

Geneanet has compiled a list of resources for Scottish genealogy which we believe will be useful for you. This is the first installment in Geneanet's information rich list of connections on the World Wide Web. See below for the links to the resources in bold in this article.

ScotlandsPeople is the official site of the **National Records of Scotland** and is an excellent resource for searching government records and archives (see their guide here) and obtaining document images for a fee. There is access to the statutory registers of births, marriages, and deaths; census returns; church records; valuation rolls; and legal records from Scotland's courts of law. Some unindexed record images can be browsed; however, in most cases, there is a pay-per-view system (credits, vouchers) to see a source document after finding an entry in an index. For privacy reasons, births less than 100 years old, marriages and divorces less than 75 years old, and deaths less than 50 years old are only available for purchase as official certificates.

The National Records of Scotland. In addition to the NRS (previously known as the National Archives of Scotland) has other sites and resources of interest to genealogists. Start with the National Records of Scotland Family History Guide. **ScotlandsPlaces** has historical maps and other data.

ScotlandsCensus has an historical timeline of the census and the NRS' main site has detailed information about each of the censuses (every ten years starting in 1841; 1921 the most recent available).

Scottish Handwriting has online resources and inperson classes in Edinburgh in paleography, the study of historical forms of handwriting (the UK National Archives has a useful page as well). Don't miss the NRS' informative guide about the pre-civil Old Parish Registers of the Church of Scotland (births, christenings, banns, marriages, deaths and burials) 1553-1854, which are available at **ScotlandsPeople**.

The Scottish Council on Archives. This non-profit organization supports archives at every level in Scotland, including community groups, with helpful best-practices for archivists, advice for historians and genealogists, and an informative family history page. You can download the SCA's handy Scottish Ancestry Guide in PDF format.

Clan of the Bells - The Burning of the Clavie

In the Scottish town of Burghead, built on the site of a Pictish promontory fort, New Year is celebrated for a second time every January 11.

This “second” New Year celebration dates from the 1750's when an “adjustment” of eleven days was required to change from the Julian calendar to the modern Gregorian calendar. Riots occurred across the nation with people demanding their 'lost 11 days' back. Instead of getting angry about this “loss” of days, the people of Burghead chose to hold an additional New Year fire festival - The burning of the Clavie.

A barrel full of staves--the Clavie--is set alight and carried around the town. This fiery procession is accompanied by a large crowd of townsfolk and visitors. The Clavie is finally placed on the ramparts of the ancient Pictish promontory fort atop Doorie Hill. The flames are allowed to burn down, and the smoldering embers tumble down the hill.

Gathering and keeping a piece of the Clavie is said to bring good luck for the coming year. The townsfolk also send pieces of the Clavie around the world to émigrés from the Burghead community.

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Enthusiasm & Authenticity - Andrew Morrison, Viscount Dunrossil

I was born and raised on “the other side of the pond,” but moved to the US in my late twenties and have now lived in Texas for over thirty years. The longer I’ve been here, the more passionate I’ve become about my Scottish heritage, and that, of course, is the story of the Scottish diaspora. We here often seem to value what Scots in Scotland take for granted.

On the other hand, friends visiting from Scotland are sometimes bemused, even confused, by some of the ways we express that enthusiasm. Sometimes it looks as if what we are doing no longer bears any relation to actual history or heritage and has taken on a life of its own. The challenge facing a heritage group like COSCA is how to channel that enthusiasm, to keep it as authentically Scottish as possible, without it degenerating into mere fantasy. If you want Game of

Thrones, turn on the television.

Balancing the desire for authenticity with the need to nurture and encourage the enthusiasm is not always an easy task. But it is an important one. Scotland is a small but emerging nation, regardless of its legal status within the United Kingdom. To any nation, the concept of soft power, of the way it can spread its influence into the world at large, is an important one, and this is especially true of a country like Scotland. We speak about the five million and the fifty million – the five million who live in Scotland and the fifty million around the world who identify as Scots. Keeping the two groups on the same page, singing from the same song sheet, as it were, matters.

So what are some of the ways we get carried away, where we risk running free from our moorings and sailing off into fantasy land? Some of the more obvious ones concern surnames, clans and families, septs and so on, and the broad area of heraldry and protocol, titles and feathers. It seems we all want to be in a clan and lots of us want to be called a laird or chief and strut around with a feather in our bonnet, brandishing the personal Banner of the King of Scots. Some have invented their own clans and even made up “clan badges” which they’ve registered as US trademarks. Needless to say, the actual clan chiefs find this less than amusing.

Most Scots are not members of a clan, nor were their ancestors. And that’s OK, at least for them. The most common names in Scotland are Smith and Brown. Smith is or was a profession, of course, and there are Smiths all over the country, just like other professions. There is no Clan Smith. Brown is a common hair color, the most common. There is no Clan Brown or Black or Gray (my own hair has

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turned from dark brown to gray while I've been here, but my clan affiliation remains the same).

Even patronymics are not all kindreds. Sam, William and Patrick/Peter are all among the most common forenames in Scotland historically, but there is no clan Simpson or Wilson or Paterson, nor ever was. One of the most common forenames of all is, of course, Andrew, after the patron saint of Scotland. There is no Clan Anderson in Scotland either, but one was founded in the US.


What some refer to as “clan creep” and the absurd proliferation of “septs” listed outside clan society tents are symptoms of this earnest desire to identify with the land of our ancestors and the mistaken belief that it can only be through the medium of a surname. We need to do a better job of developing other ways for people to express and cultivate their love for their heritage. District family associations do exist. Caledonian and St Andrew's societies are already part of COSCA too. It might be interesting to see modern guilds for the descendants of traditional Scottish professions. It would be fascinating to explore ways Smiths, Taylors, Wrights or Clarks might still be expressing their ancestral skill-sets in contemporary society.

These are difficult and delicate issues, but they must be addressed, if we are not to continue to diverge. Authenticity without enthusiasm is dry nothing. Enthusiasm without authenticity is rootless and worthless. We owe it to each other to try to identify where the fulcrum is whereby the two can be properly balanced.

To this end, a small group, with participation from the Standing Council, from COSCA and from the Society of Scottish Armigers, is hoping to produce a paper with guidance and guidelines. Scottish law doesn't extend outside the physical boundaries of Scotland, but it is my belief that most members of the Diaspora who care about their heritage care also about getting it right. Scottish law may not apply, but if one knows the right answer, good manners may be enough to ensure that people show respect for their traditions and their heritage. After all, isn't that what we say we're all about?

THE 'STONE OF DESTINY' RETURNS HOME!

There are a lot of myths, legends, and romantic notions about The Stone of Scone (that's skOOOn, not skOne) or, as you are probably more familiar with it: The Stone of Destiny. The accuracies and the tall tales about the Stone come both from within and from without Scotland's borders, but all have culminated to grant the Stone significant power and authority, regardless of what may (or may not) be truth.

From ancient times, this sacred stone was used as the site object of coronation for kings - likely long before even the reigns of Kenneth MacAlpine and Malcolm I, both Kings of Picts and Scots, removed it from the ground and, after its import, formed it into a type of 'throne.'

Some 42 Scottish Kings are believed to have been crowned between the 9th and 17th centuries using the sacred Stone in its current form. It was positioned at Moot Hill, the center - both geographically and emotionally - of the Perthshire heartland, site of present-day Scone Palace. Scone is thought to have been a place sacred to the Ancient Celts, and is one centered at the junction of two lay-lines (this tidbit for those who give credence to the intersections of lay-lines being 'places of power' around the globe, such as the sites of Stonehenge, Newgrange, the Egyptian and Mayan pyramids, and so on). There are others in Scotland, of course.

One such is in Edinburgh, where a central stone, located in the middle of present-day Edinburgh Castle, has a carved "foot"-hollow, believed to have been used by kings for declarations and validation of

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authority. It is said the right foot was placed into the hollow when addressing subjects, and, if the individual's foot matched the form in the stone, it was proof he or she was, indeed, 'Chosen of the Gods.' It is no surprise, then, that the mountain the Castle was built upon, and used as the site of hilltop fortresses for at least a millennium prior to its construction, served as a kind of capitol for Scotland since prehistory. No site, however, seems to have been as important to both the ancient and the 'modern' Scots as Scone.

Scone's importance has never been in doubt. However, what has been (and is) debated is the Stone's origins - how it came to be located at Moot Hill originally. Some have argued that the Stone was brought from the sacred Island of Anglesey (later called Mona by the Romans) in Wales, which was the legendary fortress-home of the Druids, whose members were the religious leaders of all the Celtic tribes from Brittany to Ireland, and as far north as the Hebrides.

Others have claimed that the Stone came from Iona, and was taken from the site where God is said to have appeared to St. Columba. Still others have asserted that the Stone was actually an artifact called 'Jacob's Pillow,' which was brought back from the Holy Land by an Egyptian princess named Scota in the 9th century, and given as a gift to Kenneth MacAlpine to help unite the tribes of the Celts and the Picts into one kingdom.

Stories abound, but lithic analyses done by modern researchers have shown that the material from which the Stone was formed is Perthshire sandstone, which pours a bit of cold water on the fires of

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most legends regarding its extralocal origins. They have also observed the cutting, overall shaping, and wear of the Stone, and suggest that it may have been the thresh-stone (the central stone of a threshold- i.e., a doorway) of an important building before it became the ceremonial piece it is now. And, the first concrete (no pun intended) evidence of it being used for a coronation is from a manuscript describing the ceremony of the crowning of then seven-year-old Alexander III in 1249.

Nevertheless, the Stone and its location at Scone were clearly important long before any surviving historical documents make mention of either, and the Stone itself was definitely imbued with power, whether given by human imagination and romanticism or some actual Divine authority.

This is, of course, evidenced by the Stone's reverence over the centuries and into the present day, and is why, in 1296, Edward I of England stole the Stone and took it to Westminster, where he had a new throne fashioned for himself wherein the Stone was placed in a box chamber directly beneath the seat - designed so that the monarch's derriere was positioned ever above the Stone, demonstrating his "dominance" over Scotland as a "conquered land!"

Interestingly enough, this treatment of the Stone begat still other legends, which many believe even to this day, though none have more than scant evidence to support them. One such story suggests that, in fact, Edward (and, thus, all English monarchs since) never possessed the real Stone in the first place! In the tale, the friars at

the Abbey at Scone, upon hearing of Edward's encroachment into Scotland, removed the real artifact and placed it into a grotto for its protection somewhere along the River Tay. They then hurriedly fashioned a duplicate to put in its place. One (and, truly, the only) source of evidence believers use to support the story is that analysis shows the chain and ring attachments - the carrying rings - on either side of the stone and, in fact, the areas of the stone the rings were bored into, are younger than the cuttings on the Stone itself, and fashioned from a different iron alloy typical of the Perthshire region.

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As the story concludes, the friars later forgot where they had placed the Stone, so if this account is true, the current Stone of Destiny is not only a replica, but the true Stone's location has been lost to the ages!

Regardless of its origins, or whether or not it was or is the 'real McCoy' stolen from Scone and taken to Westminster where it has hitherto resided for centuries, the Stone of Destiny and its story is a national symbol of Scotland and of Scottish pride and identity. Its possession by the Crown has been a point of bitterness, contention, and anger among Scots since its theft. So much so that many attempts to steal back the Stone were undertaken since at least the 1600s, though all but one has been thwarted.

In 1950, Ian Hamilton and a group of his friends, all students from the University of Glasgow and all avid Scottish Nationalists, knew

that security at Westminster would be low and London streets all but deserted due to the Christmas holiday. On Christmas Day, they

broke into Westminster Abbey, took the more than 300-lb. Stone (which they dropped and actually ended up breaking into two pieces!), and drove it back toward Scotland in the boot of a Ford Anglia. However, every police car they passed increased their anxiety over being caught and imprisoned, so they didn't initially make it across the border. They stopped, placed it beneath stones within the rock barriers that lined a major thoroughfare in order to disguise it, and furthered their escape northward where they could craft their alibis.

However, likely during their drive homeward, officers discovered that the doors at Westminster Abbey had been forced and, due to the fact one of the students had accidentally smashed a fixture near the throne, it was quickly seen that the Stone was missing. Immediately reported to Scotland Yard, the story spread, and broke via radio and newspaper within hours of the 'theft.' Upon hearing the news report, people all over Scotland swarmed into the streets. Cheering, chanting, and waving the Saltire, the crowds were so thick in the larger cities that they are estimated to have been larger than any Hogmanay or even Edinburgh Fringe Festival gatherings of the present day - the police didn't even attempt crowd-control, and it's said many officers were among the flag- and banner-wavers!

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Ian and his friends returned to Glasgow to find this patriotic fervour and readily joined in. He ran home to confront his parents and told them what he had done, completely ready to be scolded or even have them hand him over to authorities. However, during an interview later that year, he reported that his mum and dad had "never been prouder of him in their lives." His father, a Glaswegian tailor and 'working man,' had oft chided Ian - even had been disappointed in him - for "being so self-proud and above [his] station as to attend university," that an apparent wedge had been forced between them. Now, however, "my Da was kissing and hugging me; telling me he was never so pleased with anyone, or prouder than anyone he had ever known."

The scandal and its ensuing manhunt permeated British headlines for months. Riding the seemingly newfound wave of Scottish patriotism, Ian and his co-conspirators returned to England, whereupon they dug up the Stone, anointed it with Scotch whisky, and finally made it across the border and into Glasgow where the Stone was repaired by a sympathetic mason, and hidden in the basement of a factory outside of the city. Ian, his friend Kay Matheson, and the others then drafted an anonymous letter to King George VI wherein they offered to give back the Stone in return for the promise it would be officially repatriated to Scotland, and only to be loaned back to the Crown for future British coronations. Their terms were not yet to be met, and the manhunt continued. In fact, so thorough was the investigation that Ian and all of his friends were eventually questioned by detectives from Scotland Yard, though never formally charged. Later, the group removed the Stone to the altar at the ru-

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ins of the Abbey of Arbroath, covered it with a Saltire, and reported its location to authorities.

The British government, after repossessing the Stone, and though hailing the 'theft' (oh, the irony!) as a "grievous act of theft and vandalism," announced that it would not be pressing any charges, fearing that any arrests made and charges enacted would "necessarily serve to incite martyrdom and possible acts of retaliation." Therefore insured of their freedom, Ian and his friends then handed out statements of confession of their involvement to reporters in Glasgow; no legal action was, indeed, ever taken against them (who knew the English could keep their word...). Ian passed away on October 3, 2022 at the age of 97, but said in an interview, just prior to his death, that "[it] was the single best thing [he had] ever done in [his] very long life, and hopes that one day soon, the Stone of Destiny would be Scotland's - and only Scotland's - once again!"

Many pieces of legislation have been drafted over time for its return, more since Ian and his friends took back the Stone. But, all were defeated until 1996, when Queen Elizabeth II finally followed up on the mandate Ian Hamilton and crew had penned to her father: it was returned - though only on loan from the Crown - to Scotland, to reside in the Crown Room of the Royal Palace at Edinburgh Castle.

However, after much pressure from Holyrood, the Scottish National Party (SNP), and petitions with millions of signatures from Scots around the world, the Crown and the British government have finally agreed to fully and permanently repatriate the Stone of Scone - the Stone of Destiny - to Scotland after its final use by the British for the coronation of King Charles III on May 6, 2023. It will then be temporarily placed for viewing at the newly restored Perth City Hall Museum until it returns to Scone Abbey, within Scone Palace, in 2024 - finally home after 700 years!

Nova Scotia is the only jurisdiction in the world outside of Scotland, Ireland and the Isle of Man where a Gaelic language and its cultural heritage and identity have been passed down from generation to generation in families and communities.

Statistics Canada cites 257,205 or 27% of Nova Scotians are descended from Scottish Gaels.

Estimates based on 2016 census data and information compiled from the community indicate that, at that time, there were approximately 2,000 speakers of Gaelic in Nova Scotia. Since then, thousands of Nova Scotians have been involved in Gaelic programming in schools, institutions, and communities. Many more Nova Scotians are involved in cultural activities such as music, song and dance that stem from the Gaelic language.

PICTOU—Hector 250, celebrating the arrival of the Ship Hector in Pictou in 1773, is just six months away and plans to commemorate this significant milestone are well underway. The town of Pictou will be alive with the sounds of bagpipes, fiddles, tunes and hammers from September 15 to 17.

Events will include a sailing regatta, Bluenose II in port for deck tours, original play *The Voyage*, Gaelic and Indigenous culture and music, the Hector Ceilidh and the Hector Tattoo. A major component of the weekend will be the unveiling and first opportunity to see the restoration progress on the Hector. Visitors will be able to step aboard the ship, which is currently on blocks in the yard, and experience the below deck atmosphere and walk along the newly finished upper decks. Members of the Restoration team will be on hand to explain the process of the restoration. The relaunch of the Hector is planned for 2024 when outfitting components and underwater systems are in place.

The Charting Our Course campaign, which is funding the restoration, has raised over \$1.8 million for the ship, and community and corporate support will help us achieve our target of \$2.5 million to complete the project. Once fully restored the Hector will be able to do tours of Pictou Harbour and will be the only tall ship in Canada powered by solar energy and many 'green energy' features.

The Society is also leading a major project which will see a complete update and renovation of the Interpretive Centre. The facelift includes a new roof and public areas, innovative and interactive displays and a more thorough telling of the partnership of the Scottish settlers and the indigenous people of Pik'tuk. The entire site and ship will be fully powered by solar panels and will be a leader in using green technology in public spaces.



Clan Gregor Society - Brampton's Great Canadian Kilt Skate

Tartan flies high at Brampton's first Great Canadian Kilt Skate by Tristan Levi

BRAMPTON, Ont. — For many, the combination of brisk winter air and bare knees is the farthest from being an ideal match. But for attendees of Brampton's first Great Canadian Kilt Skate at Gage Park, both ice skates and tartan kilts were proudly worn for a merry day of Scottish-Canadian celebration.

Now going on its ninth year of annual tradition, the Great Canadian Kilt Skate is a cross-cultural, open-to-all heritage event commemorating the contributions Scots have made in Canada and around the world. Since their launch by the Scottish Society of Ottawa in 2015, kilt skates have since become beloved community occasions spreading from city to city across North America. With Canadians from Vancouver all the way to Québec joining in on the festivities, Feb. 11 would mark the day Brampton would finally get a chance to put on the plaid and hit the ice.

"Since the kilt skate this year looked like it would be much more feasible with no pandemic restrictions, I turned to the city of Brampton," says William Petrie, chair of Clans and Scottish Societies of Canada (CASSOC) and member of the Canadian chapter of the Clan Gregor Society. "I said I'd like to run a kilt skate as Clan Gregor. There would be some support from CASSOC, and that's what we set up."

Serving as a link between Canada's Scottish communities, CASSOC is a cultural organization dedicated to upholding Scottish heritage. In partnership with the Canadian branch of the Clan Gregor Society, an ancestry institution involved in the preservation and promotion of Scottish roots around the world, kilt skating was brought to Brampton for the first time in what is hoped to become a yearly series of events.

"It was just getting people out there and being able to have them wear tartan," says Petrie when asked what he most enjoyed about bringing the kilt skate to Brampton. "Seeing that, yes, there is a strong cultural aspect to the Scottish heritage that is pervasive in Canada."

With the ice of Gage Park glistening brightly under the February sun, tartan-clad Bramptonians enjoyed a pleasant Saturday afternoon skate in weather that could be mistaken for early spring. Alongside free hot chocolate and donuts, scarves and informational booklets about both CASSOC and Clan Gregor were provided to rosy-cheeked visitors.

"It turned out really well," says Petrie. "I was very pleased to have a lot of involvement from my own family. A good number of my kids showed up, and my wife was extremely eager to be a key part of the whole event."

As laughter and the sound of blades against ice rang out throughout the day, a sense of community and camaraderie was fostered between both Scottish and non-Scottish guests.

"I hope that they experienced a strong spirit of fellowship," says kilt skate organizer and blog writer Don Cumber. "Everyone together is doing this strange and eccentric thing—skating in a kilt, or in tartan. It's easy to get into conversations with others—including strangers and newcomers—when you kilt skate."

"That, to me, was the most important," adds Petrie. "It wasn't the Clan Gregor kilt skate, it was the Great Canadian Kilt Skate."

What Makes a Historian by Laura Collins (nee Hunter)

For as long as I can remember history has enthralled me. As a little girl the previous Indigenous inhabitants of our home inspired my play, stories I was told of previous generations finding artifacts guided my curiosity and historical fiction books brought my imagination to a level of possibility. Then, dreams of archeology filled my future - it is truly philosophically ironic that a young child with many years ahead of them chooses to consume themselves with the past. My interests as a child quickly extended from Indigenous inhabitation, to Greek and Roman Mythology, to Egyptology and Piracy.

Although those dreams were never achieved, throughout my adult life I have continued to fuel my passion of history. Educating myself through literature and worldly travel I have been able to call myself a historian in my own right. Each experience has opened doors to new topical interest. Many historical circumstances intertwine with multigenerational involvement - take for example Mary Queen of Scots and King James, Ragnar Lodbrok and Ivar the Boneless, Akhenaten and Tutankhamun, not to mention God and his son Jesus - the list goes on and on.

These families shaped history, but what of the families that haven't been recorded? Everyday people have molded our history just as well, those who existed in a life of common humility and actually just ... lived. This made me stop and think - what of MY history? This led me to a new branch in my studies, genealogy.

We all have been told from where once we came, every granddad has spoken of times of old - mine was no exception. My grandfather, Robert (Bob) Hunter of Troy, has since passed. His brother Edward G. Hunter, also of Troy, has helped me grasp a better knowledge of our family's immigration to Canada and what became of them afterward.

This prompted me to learn my personal story in a whole new way using 23andMe. Based on the results of my ancestry composition, the largest percentage of my DNA came from Scotland, specifically Ayrshire, the seat of Clan Hunter. I knew at this moment that Scotland would be my next travel destination - and very soon.

In October 2021, a spontaneous book of airfare took Cheri (my mother-in-law) and I on an adventure. Upon our arrival in Edinburgh we rented a vehicle, commencing our cross country tour of Scotland. For two weeks we traveled the Lowlands, Highlands and Isle of Skye witnessing breathtaking sights and incredible monuments that I had only dreamed of beholding.

Our tour was drawing to a close in the Southwest, my most anticipated portion of our journey lay just

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ahead - the seat of Clan Hunter, Hunterston Castle. As we drove toward the castle, the long lane displayed the beautiful landscape. Fall colours framed the sheep grazing in the alongside pastures. Parking at the castle, seeing it in full with the garden walls opposite felt surreal. It felt quite emotional truth be told to witness the home of my ancestors - in what order of relation did they position into the clan? If only to be witness to their manner of living. Throughout my visit of Hunterston, you could almost see and feel them in their comings and goings.

Janet met us then, she was a wonderful tour guide - she was so knowledgeable, thorough and personal. She really made us feel so involved and welcomed with our private tour of the castle and grounds. She allowed us to take our time and awe, answering the many questions we had regarding the castle's existence.

Progressing from the ground up we viewed the basement, the old hall featuring the gorgeous one-of-a-kind stags horn furniture, the bedroom, the garret, parapet and my personal favourite - the great hall. The great hall is host to irreplaceable treasures such as The Charter, Hunterston Brooch (both replicas), family safe and exquisite fireplace carving of the Clan Hunter motto "Cursum Perficio".

Other personal favourite internal features include the ancient oak beams, doors and especially the staircase. The latter was interesting conversation - Janet was explaining medieval staircases in terms of warfare and how they were designed to favour right or left-handed individuals. This brought us to the topic of my husband and his family clan, Kerr, who were known to be left-handed. The expressions "Kerr-handed" and "Corry-handed" both refer to the well-established tradition of left handedness within the family, making them useful in battle and helpful to the Hunters whom were primarily right.

Post castle we toured the extensive gardens behind the wall - witnessing them in the peak of summer months would have been absolutely beautiful. We were fortunate enough to meet one of the tenants residing in the more recently (in perspective to the castle) apartments adjacent to the castle. Here he explained they plant and tend to a fruit and vegetable garden in which they all take part and enjoy. A personal favourite aspect inside the walled garden was the dog cemetery. As I mentioned previous, Cheri my mother-in-law joined me on my journey, her fa-

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ther-in-law (my husband's grandfather) also founded a pet cemetery in Ancaster, Ontario. My son enjoys reading the children's book about the said pets inside the garden walls.

Last but not least, we visited the shop and proudly purchased a most prized possession, a sash of Clan Hunter tartan. After correspondence with Madam Pauline, I was disappointed in departing without making her acquaintance with the fear of never again having the opportunity. Little did I know this would not be the case. As a parting gift for both Janet and Madam Pauline, I brought a piece of my own Hunter heritage - maple syrup from our family farm, Hunters Maple Bush, on Hunter Road in Troy, Ontario from which I am the fourth generation.

The immersive historical experience at Hunterston Castle will remain a notable memory for many years to come. Our arrival back in Ontario was bitter sweet - missing the mountains, sea and culture, I vowed to visit Scotland again.

As the following summer quickly came upon us, I received an email from Dale Hill - the now newly appointed Clan Officer of Clan Hunter Canada. He proceeded to tell us that Madam Pauline was planning her upcoming stay in Ontario, Canada for the Fergus Highland Games in August (2022) and that she would like to visit our farm on her tour around the area. This was very exciting news! I was delighted to learn she had received our maple syrup, furthermore she wished to view our farm and the process in which it is made.

My father Edward C. Hunter, my sons Cruz and Sterling and I anticipated her arrival leading up to that day. My father was unfortunately and regretfully unable to join me in Scotland, he is also a member of Clan Hunter Canada. We felt so honoured at this once in a lifetime opportunity to host Madam Pauline on our farm.

Madam Pauline arrived with Dale, Daphne, and Dale's mother - it was unbelievable to fathom that they were finally here! We began the tour of our farm and the maple sugaring production process from start to finish, tree to table. We escorted them through our bush, pump house and sugarhouse explaining as accurately as possible as we were not currently in production with it being the summer months. Throughout the tour we were able to add in some personal conversation with Madam Pauline and continued to do so afterwards. She is truly a pleasure, very down to earth and was as equally

as interested in getting to know us in return. Again, we felt very honoured to host Madam Pauline, her exceptional and uncommon presence made it so special for us as a family, and again this will to be a notable memory for us all.

Madam Pauline was one of few Clan Chiefs to attend the festival from Scotland and being a featured Clan because of her attendance, the tent was foremost amongst others making Clan Hunter a spectacle for festival goers. We were very privileged to meet many other members of Clan Hunter Canada at the tent that morning, making new acquaintances and catching up with others. Time came for the parade of Clans – this was a highlight for our family. Carrying the Hunter flag in the procession, my father Ed, husband Derek, our sons Cruz and Sterling and I proudly walked amongst the Hunter Clan, displaying our unity for all.

The Fergus Scottish Festival and Highland games provided many interactive experiences for families to enjoy and ours was no exception. The music was fantastic, games and dancing wonderfully entertaining and the exhibits on multiple aspects of Scottish culture, both historical and current, were very educational. Overall, the festival was an absolutely fantastic experience!

We are looking forward to attending every year henceforth. A very warm thank you to Madam Pauline, Dale and all of Clan Hunter - you all have made us feel so welcome in our first year of clan involvement and are looking forward to meeting those we have not yet had the pleasure. My family is eager to attend more clan gatherings, events and festivals in years ahead and hopefully, connect some genealogy.

I feel as though all members of Clan Hunter around the globe are historians like myself. We are all searching for the same common goal - connecting to our ancestors of the past, uniting with those in the present, and of course, creating chapters for the new members of the future. I am so honoured to be a member of Clan Hunter. The welcoming inclusion has made me feel proud of the allegiance to the Clan Chief and 30th Laird, Madam Pauline Hunter of Hunterston as well as to my fellow members and kinfolk.





Our clocks at least in some provinces have recently changed ahead for daylight savings and hopefully spring is just around the corner even though it doesn't seem like it. In many provinces, it still looks like the middle of winter but I am excited to see the spring blooms and early flowers colours and soon the colours of our tartans kilts will be seen at more events with sounds of the bagpipes nearby. Time is fast approaching to attend Scottish Highland Games and Celtic Festivals across Canada.

January 25th many of you celebrated the life and legacy of Scotland's famous poet Robert Burns exactly 264 years after his birth.

The mansion was donated to the government in 1942, due to rising costs and the need for upkeep. During the war it became Shaughnessy Military Hospital, then served as an auxiliary facility for many years. Eventually, it was taken over by the University Women's Club in 1962 and they occupy it today while it has become a learning place for the community. The manor hosts many great functions including weddings. It is a beautiful place to explore at 1489 McRae Ave., Vancouver, BC.

Owen and other guests donned their tartan attire and paid tribute to the poet Robert Burns while enjoying an evening of all things Scottish. The order of the evening was great Scottish food, whisky tasting, music, speeches, jokes, and dancing the night away.




World's Oldest-known Surviving Scottish Tartan

A piece of fabric found in a bog in the Scottish Highlands could be the oldest traditional tartan ever found. According to scientists, the tartan could be up to 500 years old and is believed to have been made around the time of the reign of Mary, Queen of Scots. It survived because of the lack of air getting to it. The tartan is now on display at the Scottish V&A Dundee museum's Tartan exhibition which runs until January 2024. The show features more than 300 objects including items from the world of fashion, graphic design, film and performance and art.



Meet the authors

On Thursday, January 26th, 2023, I had the pleasure of participating in an online event by the Scottish Society of Antiquaries called "meet the authors". Hector MacQueen & Allan Brotherwick discussed "Law, Lordship and tenure: The fall of the Black Douglasses.

This book is a new interpretation of the fall of later medieval Scotland's greatest noble family, the Black Douglasses, in 1455. The discussion reaches back in time to over a century before, as the family began its rise to the pinnacle of Scottish society. The killing of William eighth earl of Douglas by King James II in 1452 receives particular attention, as also the way in which he, his brother James (his successor as earl), and their predecessors exercised their power and authority as earls and lords, and it is suggested that their identifiable failings in this provide the key to understanding the catastrophe that befell the family in 1455.

The principal analytical tool is the law relevant to these events and the specific meaning and significance of the documents (which is often a legal question) that evidence them. It is argued that this form of analysis is at least as relevant as any more political approach and that 'legal consciousness' was a vital feature of Scottish noble society.

I had the pleasure of attending this online event with many Fellows. The presentation included many interesting slides. One of them showed the cast of the seal of William, 8th earl of Douglas. It displayed a kneeling savage holding a club in his right hand, and supports a couché shield on his left arm. If you look closely at the shield, you will see the Arms of Douglas that incorporate a human heart similarly to that of clan Logan. Let's not forget that in 1330, Sir James Douglas was accompanied by brothers Sir Robert Logan of Restalrig and Sir Walter Logan; along with Sir William de Keith, Sir William de St. Clair of Rosslyn in bringing the heart of the dead king Robert I of Scotland to the Holy land. Not surprising how certain symbols link us all together. This is why I tell people all Scottish Clans are linked through time at different moments.

Many slides of interest were shown. I enjoyed seeing those of the tomb of the 5th and 7th earl of Douglas as I like seeing stonework and architecture and these tombs were very similar in structure. There were other documents shared that were interesting to see such as James II's remission for the Livingstons dated August 27th, and James II's transumpt of Douglas Charters dated January 20th, 1449. The host was very good at sharing information with the Fellows in attendance. There's always something to learn when looking back in time.

The hosts Hector MacQueen & Allan Brotherwick did a fantastic job presenting the material. I hope to be able to participate in other Fellow meetings in the future.

Scottish clans are kinship organizations. Historically, clans were sophisticated institutions which defined the political landscape of medieval Scotland. Clans were headed by chiefs and bonded by a common territory, and were as varied as the diverse geography of Scotland. They were integral to the feudal society of

the Scottish Highlands and Islands, and were also present throughout the Lowlands, particularly in the Borders region. The word "clan" derives from the Gaelic clann, literally meaning children, showing how kinship (both real and fictional) was key to the understanding of Gaelic society. Rather than being limited to strict blood relation as we might today view it, however, clan kinship extended to include the whole community who were viewed as an extended family. The members of historical clans were closely bonded by shared territory, resources, and customs.

Today, clans are modern social institutions with an interest in preserving history and traditions, exploring genealogy, and promoting global kinship ties. Clans have a mission of promoting a sense of shared history and identity among the Scottish diaspora. Like highland games, they provide the opportunity to engage with heritage and to forge connections in a modern world. Clans are also structured by the Court of the Lord Lyon in Scotland.

Clans at the Glengarry Highland Games

During the Glengarry Highland Games, clan societies and local heritage organizations put on exhibits and provide information to visitors on history and their activities. We invite you to visit the Clan Buildings in the northwest part of the fairgrounds to experience the exhibits and chat with our knowledgeable representatives. Musical entertainment and presentations by local speakers are featured throughout the day on Saturday.
