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Frae the Chair Membership Proposal

At the November 2022 AGM the following motion was passed.

"Motion re Individual Membership: Moved by Sylvia McPhee, Seconded by Doug Doughty, that CASSOC look into becoming a National Scottish Organization with a new class/type of individual membership with the understanding that there may be legal fees and other costs that will be paid from the existing development fund. Carried with one Nay vote. Mel Fitton volunteered to be on the Committee investigating this concept."

Combinations of health and other issues, basically life happening, resulting in a delay of progress on the motion until May 4, 2023 which is when a membership committee meeting was held to discuss the motion in the context of a working document titled

"A Call for Clans and Scottish Societies of Canada (CASSOC) to become the National Scottish Organization for all Canadians"

The outcome of the meeting was unanimous agreement on the document with the understanding that next steps were as described in it. The first of these being "Define the classes of membership for the national organization as well as value propositions for the classes of membership."

The third step is "Create the required bylaw changes and seek first membership then regulatory approval."

The purpose of this article is to prepare our membership for this third step by publishing the working document and asking for your input on it. As the primary force behind the motion and the overall initiative, I want to clarify my understanding of why this is what we must do. Please forgive the point form nature of this, my belief is that using this format helps with clarity.

- The majority of Scots whether in Scotland or abroad, are not part of a clan or family. Unless there are local societies for them to join, no other option exists. As the national Scottish organization we can fulfill this need. As of the last census, there are over 6.6 million Canadians of Scottish descent
- Clans and Scottish Societies of Canada suffers from a continuous dearth of volunteer resources and the monetary resources that could be used to offset it. Having a larger pool of candidate volunteers to draw on while at the same time have a larger revenue stream provides a doubled up means of solving this problem. Currently, even with our enlarged membership, our annual revenue is just over \$5k and all who serve in CASSOC are already double-dipped, triple-dipped or more as volunteers.

- In contrast to many other organizations, a pipeline for members does not exists for almost all of our clan, family and society memberships. This carries through to us not having a pipeline for volunteers as well. This results in just waiting for potential members to be ready and that phase of their life to be interested in participating if a mechanism for doing so exists. In our current form we can only look for solutions for our members and hope they can find ways to try them, to find out what will succeed. As a larger organization with the greater resource that follow, we could test to find what would work while also being ourselves a membership pipeline for our organizations.
- Closely associated with the pipeline challenges is the sustainability of our membership organizations as well as CASSOC itself. Yes, we've gone through similar extinction level events such as many of our members have. For those who did survive, it likely was due to dedicated individuals who kept the organization going even if on a life-support level of existence. For others, they just vanished and occasionally rose again when new interest and drive arose in following generations. We can fix this as a larger organization by, for ourselves, having a broader board of directors with staggered terms of office and much greater momentum that was is coming from our few dedicated volunteers nowadays.

For our member organizations, we can provide a safety net of having mechanisms where a member shutting down can temporarily come under an umbrella of us as a larger organization. We would also have the means to apply funding to help if that was needed and appropriate.

- My belief is that a National Scottish Organization is inevitable due to both the growth in numbers of those in Canada of Scottish descent and from the dampening/loss of culture and recognition that we are currently seeing ride in with other's finding of blame and faults for the mostly well-intentioned actions of our ancestors. They weren't different people, bad people but just you and I in a different time and under earlier norms and beliefs. We need a better ways to protect our culture and heritage.

A separate National Scottish Organization would lessen the opportunity for maintaining guidance by our current membership. Without this guidance, the previously mention benefits of the larger organization for our existing membership would be at risk. There be two paths with this, the first that the separate National Scottish Organization is autonomous and thus the risk of no benefits, the second that it instead takes on our current membership in some form and thus we eventually become irrelevant just waiting for the next extinction level event. It either case, unless we evolve to be the National Scottish Organization, our organization's days are numbered.

- Lastly, as the National Scottish Organization, our objectives, goals and words will carry more weight as the voice of the Scottish Diaspora in Canada. There is none else right now except us in our current form having the perspective in others that we are a small organization in size and influence.

Please reach out to me and provide your thoughts, your encourage, your dissension on this, my understanding of what we must become, what we must do.

A Call for Clans and Scottish Societies of Canada (CASSOC) to become the National Scottish Organization for all Canadians

What's New?

Until now, Scottish organizations in Canada have been segmented, limited by specific interests, heritage, geographical boundaries, and traditional means of communication. They have mostly been constrained by a sense of community equating to physical proximity.

Today, however, we possess the tools necessary for persistent, meaningful connections across distances—tools like Zoom, YouTube, and social media platforms have demonstrated that a vibrant, cohesive community can thrive beyond physical boundaries.

Why Now?

Our culture and heritage face unprecedented challenges—from a benign "wallpaper effect" to more insidious forms of cultural appropriation and historical neglect. Voices from the past have told us there is no room or need for our Scottish culture because we are a founding nation, a claim that has led to our contributions being diminished and dismissed. Thus resulting in our potential being ignored.

Many Scottish organizations globally face a sustainability crisis, with aging populations and a lack of new membership threatening their very existence. CASSOC, like the majority of its member organizations, suffers from this threat of non-continuity. We know that CASSOC has undergone extinction-level events in the past and, as a volunteer organization relying on those who are already volunteers in their own organizations, it will face such challenges again. Currently, CASSOC does not have a succession plan, nor does there seem to be a viable path to establishment of one.

Like those in Scotland, the majority of Canadians of Scottish heritage do not have a clan or family with which they may associate. Nor are there always local societies such for them to connect with. Cur-

rently, there is no national organization as an option for these Canadians without a clan or family heritage. In a recent editorial, the president of one of CASSOC's members, has even put this as having pity for them because "they do not belong."

Yet, amidst these challenges lies a wealth of opportunity with that vast majority of Canadians who possess some form of Scottish ancestry: they are a deep, untapped well of potential community members. We, in CASSOC, often encounter them at highland events where we assist visitors in researching their clan or family affiliations. Sadly for some, we must almost apologize with "You don't belong to a clan or family" and offer no further recourse for their desire to belong.

What is the Vision?

We envision the Clans and Scottish Societies of Canada evolving into a broader National Scottish Organization in Canada that transcends traditional limitations, harnessing modern tools to foster a sense of belonging, purpose, and hope for all Canadians who carry our Scottish spirit in their hearts.

This expanded CASSOC will not be confined by narrow interests, location, or the need for physical proximity. Instead, it will be a dynamic, inclusive community that nurtures individual growth and celebrates our collective heritage. It will strive to identify, address, and share solutions for the common problems we see in our own current members and many other heritage organisations around the world.

Our ambitions are clear:

- To unite young and old, bridging the gap between generations and fostering intergenerational dialogue and learning.
- To provide a path and reason for individuals to have a meaningful and gratifying participation in the community of the Scottish Diaspora in Canada.
- To embrace our past while rejecting the notion that it defines our future. We recognize our history, warts and all, as a source of learning and strength.
- To constantly provide a means for the exchange of ideas and solutions amongst those individuals and organisations of Scottish heritage in Canada and globally.
- To build a sustainable future for Scottish culture and heritage in our nation, ensuring that it thrives and adapts in a changing world.
- To measure success not just by numbers, but by the impact we have on the lives of our members, our community, and the world at large. Success means bettering the lives of those we serve, now and in perpetuity.

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- We commit to serving our current generations and those to come with dignity and respect, doing what is right, not what is easy.

As a testament to our shared history, traditions, and the unyielding spirit of the Scottish blood in our veins, this new CASSOC represents a call to all who share in our Scottish heritage, to those who seek a community of purpose, hope, and belonging.

Whether you are driven by a passion for athletics, entertainment, academics, history, or social activism, there would be a place for you within this new version of CASSOC.

To paraphrase from the stone on Rob Roy's grave: "Scottish despite them!"

How Will It Work?

This national organization would have multiple classes of membership. One would be an organizational type of membership, equivalent to the current single class of membership that CASSOC has. Each of these members would have representation for elections and other acts of governance similar to how CASSOC members currently have delegates.

A new, separate class of membership would be for individuals and families separate from existing clan, family, or society members. These members would have representation by elected delegates from among themselves, based on groupings of commonality and/or interests.

This new class of individual and family membership would be based on being members for life but varying as to being active or inactive with associated variations on benefits and rights. The strategy with this is to help maintain an ongoing pipeline of participation for this class of membership as they transition through the natural phases of life and engagement.

This national organization would have the resources to undertake activities including scholarships, grants, and educational programs that are beyond the current reach of CASSOC. These resources would come from the much larger number of members who will contribute both financially and through volunteerism, drive, and imagination.

This national organization would be able to hold and/or sponsor events such as a Tartan Day Parade in parts of Canada where there wouldn't be one otherwise. It could hold and/or sponsor Ceilidh, Tattoo, and Festival events at various exhibitions and fairs where there's value in a Scottish presence that is not currently being fulfilled. Events at the CNE, PNE, Royal Winter Fair, Stampede, and so on come to mind.

This national organization would not act as a replacement for clans, families, and societies but would

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be a partner in terms of helping to fund and provide a pipeline of members to those organizations. An individual/family member of this national organization could designate that their membership is associated with an organization class member, and thus this national organization would channel funds and other resources to the organization class member on that basis.

This national organization would actively encourage its members to form new organization class member groups whenever possible. Conversely, a waning organizational class member could elect to be subsumed into the national organization as a chapter or council, with the knowledge that a return to an organizational class membership is not only possible but strongly encouraged.

This national organization would offer to support local chapters of international clans and families where such support would bypass barriers that we know some international organizations currently experience.

This national organization would be listened to and would have authority as speaking nationally to the support of Scottish culture and history. Far beyond what CASSOC may dream of doing right now.

The core governance of this national organization would rest with the organization class members, the existing class of membership in CASSOC. If this national organization is formed separately from CASSOC, then this core governance aspect disappears unless this national organization implements an organization class membership itself. In this later scenario, this separate national organization becomes a competitor and a serious threat to CASSOC's survival. CASSOC would become irrelevant.

What Are Next Steps?

- Define the classes of membership for the national organization as well as value propositions for the classes of membership.
- Define the form of governance for the new national organization.
- Create the required bylaw changes and seek first membership then regulatory approval.
- Plan the transition for existing CASSOC governance to the new format.
- Plan the implementation of the ways for the new classes of membership to join.
- Execute the plans

Your input on this, as always, is welcomed, This document will evolve and be updated as we work through the steps and bring to a state of being presented and voted on as bylaw change at a general meeting.

Renewals, Invoicing and Member Information Updates

Thanks to all for your membership and support. As of publication, our membership has grown to 100 from under 48 in 2019 and we're just past half of 2024. This growth has meant that our process for renewals and membership information management has evolved as follows:

1. A formal accounting system has been used to issue the required renewal invoices. These will be sent over the next couple of days to the individuals/email for your organization using information we currently have. The invoices are dated July 1, 2024 and due August 31, 2024, our fiscal year-end.

Payment may be by Interac, PayPal, credit card through PayPal, credit card by phone after August 1 and by mailing a physical cheque. There is no charge to you for any payment method other than payment for postage if you mail a cheque.

We ask that you make payments in CAD however the equivalent in other currencies can be handled.

2. At the same time we're incrementally implementing an online membership management capability plus updating what information we keep for your organization. In our early days, mailing addresses were important for all contacts and the use of email was that of science fiction. Nowadays we only require a mailing address for your organization but just an email address for other contacts. Phone numbers are nice to have but this is optional.

A key reason for this change in the type of data we're collecting is security mandated by regulations as well as helping to protect our members' data from the nasties out there.

All members should use our new form to update their organization's information. This is the form used for new members as well, so those who have recently joined using the form do not need to do anything unless your information has recently changed. Indicate in the comments that it is an update.

Going forward, we will implement a way for your delegate or designate to update your organization's information as you require. We recognize that your AGM elections and other changes occur at annual dates far different from our own year-end!

Rugby Canada is the national governing body of the sport of rugby union in Canada. In that role, it currently serves over 29,000 registered participants in a variety of roles, from players to coaches, club administrators, and referees. The sport of rugby in Canada has seen a year over year growth for the past two decades, with women and youth leading that increase.

Encompassing all ten provinces, Rugby Canada provides support via administrative oversight and implementation of registration and insurance programs. This allows rugby in the provinces and various regions to focus on the development of the sport in the respective catchment areas. The investment in the grassroots program Rookie Rugby has allowed Rugby Canada to reach new sport and recreation enthusiasts at the youth level.

Rugby Canada has created a number of key national championships to allow participants from across the country to test themselves annually and also allow selectors to preview the next generation of rugby player from around the country.

Player welfare is also a key component of Rugby Canada, with the implementation of World Rugby's Concussion Protocol program being introduced to all the provinces and support provided by key trainers to help identify and keep safe all participants. To emphasize its commitment to player welfare, Rugby Canada implemented a program specifically designed to educate those involved in the sport on the importance of injury awareness, prevention and recovery. This program is called Rugby Canada Play Smart – Putting Players First.

From the modern perspective, it certainly has proven to be a dramatic journey from the earliest days of the sport in the 1860's when it was first played in Canada amongst sailors from visiting nations at coastal ports of call. Despite the advent of North American football and the Canadian Football League, rugby's DNA in Canada is obvious, including the **CFL's Grey Cup being recognized as the Rugby Football championship trophy until the 1930's**.

In 1974 the formalization of the sport occurred as the Canadian Rugby Union was formed, and incorporated by the Government of Canada, which became the foundation for today's Rugby Canada organization.

The cost for tea is \$12.00 for adults and youth, \$8.00 for children under 10 years of age, children under 5 are free.







President's Message: It's time to get your kilt on

It is always encouraging to see people wearing the Bell of the Borders tartan at our clan tents as Bells enjoy time together and remember their heritage. It is a beautiful design that gets a lot of complements wherever it is displayed.

It was sad that we recently had a Bell show up at our tent with the wrong tartan that some vendor sold them based on errors in the tartan books. I checked on the kilt vendor I usually recommend to see what a Bell of the Borders kilt would cost him in wool and discovered it was not currently available because the tartan fabric is out of stock. The acrylic tartan is still available.

When our lovely tartan is in short supply, it is more expensive and difficult to order a new kilt, or to make a new tartan flag, or sash. Some kilt vendors remove Bell of the Borders from their list of available tartans when it is out of stock. That is because the weavers have a minimum order of 16

meters (or 17.5 yards) to weave a custom order, so a single kilt with a custom weaving order could cost \$1,000.

CBNA can coordinate several orders to have a weaver in Scotland make the fabric if you contact us at shop@clanbell.org. This can bring the cost for an 8-yard kilt down to \$500 from a kilt vendor, or about \$350 per kilt if Clan Bell uses our wholesale contract. The lower cost takes more coordination and has risk that a kilt is ordered with incorrect measurements.

Coordinating this effort is an excellent opportunity for a volunteer with skills in fabric and sewing. If you have knowledge and are willing to help, this is your chance to shine and as we get Bell of the Borders back in stock and save our members on a new kilt, sash, Billie skirt for the ladies, or a tartan flag. You don't have to buy anything yourself, but CBNA can fund weaving of additional fabric to keep the tartan in stock after the group orders. To volunteer or be part of a committee, email me at President@clanbell.org.

If you'd like to have something that uses Bell of the Borders tartan, or would like to help evaluate the potential orders, fabrics, etc. now is the time to let us know. One Bell has already expressed interest in a kilt order to replace his 30-year-old Bell kilt. The Bell we met recently with the mistaken tartan of another clan is also likely to be interested in getting the better kilt.

What's in a Tartan

A note from Clan Bell newsletter editor Stephanie Bell-Clements Adams: I have spent several months compiling information in order to write an article regarding the myths that have been created about tartan and the true history of tartan. Then after all the Internet and publication research, I stumbled upon this article written by Matthew New-some. Mr. Newsome has written what I feel is the definitive article about tartan. My thanks also to the Scottish Tar-tans Museum for their candor in reprinting this article on their Website:

This is an excerpt from the article "Generations of Highland Dress" written by Rev. Mr. Matthew Newsome originally published in 2003 at www.albanach.org.

What about the cloth the kilt is (usually) made from — the tartan? As stated earlier, archaeological evi-dence of tartan cloth being worn in Scotland dates from the third or fourth century AD. And the written record attests to tartan being especially characteristic of Highland clothing throughout the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. But were these "clan tartans" as we know them today? The short answer is, "No!" The first thing to realize about this early tartan cloth is that it was all being hand woven by individual weavers in their own homes or small cottage businesses.

Yes, they likely had certain favorite patterns that they would produce on a regular basis, but they also (like any artisan) would like to be creative and come up with new, never before seen, individual designs. Yes, they would certainly use a lot of the colors available with the natural dyes from the region, but they also would have access, through trade, to dyes and ingredients from other places. In short, the colors and de-signs of the tartan varied greatly, and nothing like a "clan tartan" system had even been conceived of, let alone put into practice.

The association of names with tartan designs came about as a result of the industrialization of the weaving industry. The first commercial, largescale producer of tartan cloth in Scotland was William Wilson & Son's of Bannockburn. They were the only tartan firm licensed to provide cloth the Highland Regiments during the period of Proscription (up till 1782). The need for mass production of cloth to fill large military orders led to the standardization of colors and patterns for the cloth. These standardized tartans were certainly in use by the 1780s.

At first these tartans were simply assigned numbers to identify one from another. But towards the end of the eighteenth century, Wilson's began to label their tartans with names, usually names of towns or districts. At the end of the century family names began to be used, and this practice increased greatly in the early nineteenth century. Why? Marketing, as much as anything else. Why does Ford no longer make Model Ts and instead now sells Windstars and Explorers? The names sell better. But just as no one today would assume that only people of Cherokee descent drive Jeep Cherokees, no one then believed that only MacDonalds could wear the MacDonald tartan. People would pick out a tartan to wear based on what they

liked, not what their name or supposed ancestry was.

In the year 1800 there were perhaps 90 to 100 "named tartans." Today there are over 7000. The period of the nineteenth century saw a great rise of interest in all things Scottish, and the development of a very romanticized notion of Highland Dress. After the Jacobite uprisings were put down and the Act of Proscription enforced, the kilt ceased to be a part of the daily dress of Highland people. During the nineteenth century it was revived as a form of ceremonial dress, and all the trappings that go with ceremonial clothing — many borrowed from the military — grew along with the changing fashions of the kilt.

Part of this process was the identification of a tartan with the family, clan, or place whose name it bore. This was a development of tradition that was encouraged by the chiefs of the clans. Stripped of any political power, one of the few remaining prerogatives of the chief was what tartan would represent his clan. With people of Scottish descent now scattered across the globe, the use of the "clan tartan" to identify clan members and unify them around a chief served a definite purpose in the new, international Scottish community.

Even today, there are no rules or regulations dictating Highland fashion or tartan choice. The most "traditional" thing you can do is to select a tartan based on its appearance rather than its name! However, tartans today do represent things, whether a clan, family, city, business, or event. Most people choose to wear a tartan that represents some part of their own heritage. In the end, though, that choice is completely up to you.

The Scottish Register of Tartans provides the following summary definition of tartan:


Tartan (the design) is a pattern that comprises two or more different solid-coloured stripes that can be of similar but are usually of differing proportions that repeat in a defined sequence.

The sequence of the warp colours (long-ways threads) is repeated in same order and size in the weft (cross-ways threads).

The majority of such patterns (or setts) are symmetrical, i.e. the pattern repeats in the same colour order and proportions in every direction from the two pivot points.

In the less common asymmetric patterns, the colour sequence repeats in blocks as opposed to around alternating pivots but the size and colour sequence of warp and weft remain the same.

Bylaw Changes - Names and Criteria

One of the effect of our membership growth is an increase in diversity of the types of members we have. However this was not reflected in our bylaws nor in the names we were using. This has been addressed by the following bylaw changes, as approved by the board on May 28, 2024 and to be ratified at the next AGM.

Preamble: the CASSOC By-Law, 3.1a states:

The aims and objectives of CASSOC shall include, but shall not be limited to, the following:

To advance Scottish Cultural Heritage in Canada, such Scottish culture be defined to include, but not be restricted to, traditional Highland, Island and Lowland cultures, whether in Scotland, Canada or wherever Scottish Culture may be expressed;

MOTION as approved by the BOARD of DIRECTORS

That the CASSOC By-Law, items 3.1b, 3.2, and 4.1 be amended as follows:

Item 3.1b: to insert "in support of 3.1a" after the word "foster"; to delete "Scottish federations, clans, societies or"; and in 3.1.b.iv: to delete "Scottish".

Thus:

b. To foster, in support of 3.1a, the organization of and co-operation and communication between groups through the initiation and co-ordination of projects and undertakings. Such projects and undertakings may:

- encompass all those interested in Scottish Culture and heritage;
- II. include the preservation of Scottish and Scottish-Canadian history, culture, language and fine arts;
- III. include research into any related matters;
- IV. include liaison with other groups and organizations wherever located;
- V. include the establishment and/or maintenance of an office, cultural centres, libraries, historical museums and research facilities anywhere, provided such are available to all Canadians.

Item 3.2 NAME: To insert, after the word "French.", "Subject to the conditions spelled out in the Canada Not-For-Profit Corporations Act - (11) Alternate Name, the names Scots of Canada and Scots Canada may be used by the organization."

Thus:

The name of the organization shall be Clans and Scottish Societies of Canada in English and in French shall be Clans et Sociétés Écossaises du Canada, hereinafter called CASSOC in English and CESEDC in French. Subject to the conditions spelled out in the Canada Not-For-Profit Corporations Act - (11) Alternate Name, the names Scots of Canada and Scots Canada plus Canadécosse in French may be used by the organization.

Item 4.1 MEMBERSHIP: to delete, after "open to", "all Scottish groups, clans, federations, associations, societies and clubs represented in Canada interested in" and to insert, "any group that is aligned with furthering the aims and objectives of CASSOC as stated in CASSOC's bylaws 3.1 Aims and Objectives."

Thus:

Subject to the approval of the CASSOC Board of Directors, membership in CASSOC is open to any group that is aligned with furthering the aims and objectives of CASSOC as stated in CASSOC's By-Law 3.1a Aims and Objectives.

Change summary:

- Bylaw 3.1 defines the aims and objectives of our organization. It is better to refer back to a single
 point of definition than to have portions of the aims and objectives repeated or interpreted in
 other bylaws. This reduces the possibility of inconsistency and simplifies understanding and management.
- Removing the list of group types simplifies and avoids unintentional exclusion of a member type.
- Since our early days we've had members at times who were not 'Scottish' in the sense we were
 intending however they aligned with our aims and objectives. Genealogical and Celtic organizations being good examples. What mattered was their alignment with our aims and objectives so
 the changes just reflect this.
- The name 'Clans and Scottish Societies of Canada' has not reflected the diversity the membership
 for quite some type. We have non-clan members such as family and house. We have games and
 festivals. We have businesses and now even have publications, sports, and historical types.
 Names that are shorter but provide a broader scope such as Scots Canada, Scots of Canada and,
 in French, Canadécosse correct this issue.



Two Full Days of Celtic Culture Aug. 31 & Sept. 1st.







I WANT A KILTI

House of Cassady - Unique opportunity to make your very own Scottish kilt!

There's nothing more iconically Scottish than the kilt. They often come in different forms, and variable materials, but there is a long rooted tradition of kiltmaking that has specific methods of construction associated with it. Almost entirely stitched by hand, an heirloom grade kilt should last more than a lifetime (well, unless it's really seeing hard wear, such as pipers and dancers).

Come on a kiltmaking adventure with me, Robin Cassady-Cain. I trained in traditional kiltmaking methods in Scotland at a professional level Kiltmaker's academy on the Royal Mile of Edinburgh.

Almost entirely stitched by hand, on this four day workshop, you will learn how to measure for making a kilt, how to set up the kilt length to "the stripe", and the multiple different steps, using a variety of stitches, that go into making a finished, traditional Scottish kilt.

This adventure will take place over the month of November 2024 at the Contemporary Textile Studio (www.textilestudio.ca) in Toronto. The Contemporary Textile Studio Co-operative was established in 2006 by a group of textile artists seeking, among other things, a home for the promotion of textile arts and design. The studio is located in 401 Richmond Street West, a well-known cultural hub in downtown Toronto that is home to many galleries, artist-run centres, and art collectives.

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

The following is a request for support from the Falkirk Supporters Society, based in Falkirk, a town in the Central Lowlands of Scotland.



Background/History of Falkirk

The members of your society may have some connection to Falkirk as the town has a long and varied rich history.

This includes the Antonine Wall, which stretches across the centre of Scotland, passing through the town which marked the northern frontier of the Roman Empire. Much of the best evidence of Roman occupation in Scotland has been found in Falkirk, including a large hoard of Roman coins.

Falkirk is also a well-known historic sight of two famous Scottish battles.

- The Battle of Falkirk fought on 22 July 1298, saw the defeat of William Wallace by King Edward I of England. The battle was famously re-enacted in the 1995 movie Braveheart depicting the life of William Wallace played by Mel Gibson.
- The Battle of Falkirk Muir took place on 17 January 1746, the Jacobites under Charles Edward Stuart Defeated a government army commanded by Lieutenant General Henry Hawley.

The memorial in the picture is in the village of Wallacestone, just south of Falkirk, on the site refuted to be where William Wallace watched over the Battle of Falkirk.

The town is at the junction of the Forth and Clyde and Union Canals, a location which proved key to its growth as a centre of heavy industry during the Industrial Revolution. In the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, Falkirk was at the centre of the iron and steel industry, underpinned by the Carron Company The company made very many different items, from flat irons to kitchen ranges to fireplaces to benches to railings and many other items, but also carronades, small cannons, for the Royal Navy

James Watt cast some of the beams for his early steam engine designs at the Carron Iron Works in 1765.

John Logie Baird, who invented the television, held a demonstration of the 1st television in the Temperance Cafe, Falkirk, in late 1925, weeks before he officially unveiled his invention to the public.

The Rosebank Distillery's history begins in 1840 in Camelon, Falkirk. Success followed and, by the 20th Century, Rosebank was revered the world over as 'The King of the Lowlands'. The doors of the Rosebank closed in 1993, with the original stills stolen during the Christmas and New Year holiday of 2008/09. However, in 2017 the site was acquired, and the distillery and the famous Rosebank whisky, will return to the town of Falkirk in 2024.

Falkirk has become synonymous with the remarkable feat of engineering that is the Falkirk

Wheel, the only rotating boat lift of it's kind in the world linking the Forth and Clyde and Union Canals that opened in 2002.

The most striking feature of Falkirk's landscape is the 98 feet high <u>Kelpies</u>, opened in 2014 reflecting the mythological transforming beasts possessing the strength and endurance of ten horses. The Kelpies represent the lineage of the heavy horse of Scottish industry and economy, pulling the wagons, ploughs, barges, and coalships that shaped the geographical layout of the Falkirk area.

Falkirk Football Club

Falkirk is also the proud home of Falkirk Football Club, the town's professional football (soccer) team established in 1876.

The club played it's home matches at Brockville Park until 2004 when the new Falkirk Stadium was built, and the club's most notable victories were its Scottish Cup wins in 1913 and 1957. The club is most proud of it's links to the Falkirk Community supporting the development of youth football for boys and girls from an early age through to its senior men's and women's teams. The Club's nickname is The Falkirk Bairns. A "Bairn" is the Scottish word for a child, and those born in the Falkirk region are affectionately known as a "Falkirk Bairn".

The Club's community links have been extended as it recently has become a fan owned club consisting of a Patrons Group, Major shareholders, and the Falkirk Supporters Society.



Our Society - The Falkirk Supporters Society

Falkirk Supporters Society are a democratically organised group who buy shares in Falkirk Football Club.

A SHORT HISTORY:

Whether Burnet(t) evolved from Burnard/Bernard or was an individual surname in its own right has been debated. Whilst 11th century records of Burnard/Bernard exist in Anglo-Saxon England in Bedfordshire, Hampshire and Wiltshire and later in the 13th century in southern Scotland, there are several instances where the name can be shown to be interchangeable. There are also differing opinions as to whether the early members of the family had Norman or Anglo-Saxon origins. Burnards were given the large barony of Farningdoun / Farnington in Roxburghshire, Scotland under a new system of land-holding instigated by King David I. As King David had a particular wish to introduce Norman or Flemish settlers to his Scottish kingdom it would not be unreasonable to assume that the Burnards were of that extraction. In this area the name evolved to Burnet and the family became associated with the lands of Burnetland and Barns. A John Burnard accompanied King David II on his journey south ending in the defeat of the King at the Battle of Neville's Cross in 1346. Burnard, who owned Scottish lands of Ardross in Fife and of Currie in Midlothian, was killed in 1346. Alexander Burnard had his services to King Robert I rewarded by the granting of lands on the banks of the River Dee, in the parish of Banchory Ternan west of Aberdeen. He was, for a time, Keeper of the adjacent Royal Forest of Drum, the badge of office of which is considered to be the Horn of Leys. The procedure of 'Cornage' comprised the use of a symbolic horn in the process of land grants (a form of lease from the Crown). His descendants, the principal family of Burnett of Leys, gave rise to a number of branches in north- east Scotland namely Burnett of Craigmyle, Burnett of Camphill, Burnett of Crimond, Burnett of Kemnay, Burnett of Elrick, Burnett of Countesswells & Kepplestone, Burnett-Stuart, Burnett of Lethenty, Burnett of Kirkhill, Burnett of Daladies and Burnett of Powis along with Burnett of Monboddo and Burnett-Ramsay of Balmain both in Kincardineshire. From the 16th century the main residence of the Burnetts of Leys was Crathes Castle and the present Chief of the family James C. A. Burnett of Leys lives nearby at House of Crathes. The Burnetts of Leys also acquired and extended Muchalls Castle, located a short distance away near the coast, completing the work in 1627.

During the first 3 days we enjoyed Gaelic Classes with Emily McEwan every morning, social meetings with Sir John McEwen, our Commander, every afternoon, organized walks to both the MacEwen Motte and the MacEwen Cairn. The Cairn is believed to mark the position of the MacEwen castle. On Saturday morning we held the Clan MacEwen Society AGM and the MacEwen Family Convention in the

afternoon. There were many other activities...games for the children, Ceilidhs in the evenings.... On Sunday we walked to the MacEwen Wood and Orchard in Tighnabruaich, followed by Kirkin 'O the Tartan in the main tent and Farewells.

The weather was not conducive to enjoying many outside activities, sadly we were not able to enjoy boat tours on Loch Fyne, but that did not spoil the incredible atmosphere.





In 1794, Rev. Alexander MacFarlane wrote in his Statistical Account of the parish of Kilfinan; "On a rocky point on the coast of Loch Fyne about a mile below the church is to be seen the vestige of a building called Caisteal Mhic Eoghain, or Mac Ewen's castle".

In 1990, The Clan Ewen Society had a cairn erected among the ruins of Caisteal Mhic Eoghain near Kilfinan on the shores of Loch Fyne.

The River Denys Reunion in Cape Breton will be held on the August long weekend of 2024. A committee is organizing an in person reunion of the descendants of Duncan McLennan who arrived in Cape Breton in 1821 at age 81 with his sons. Alan Maclennan is one of four hosts for the event. The event will be available through Eventbrite and advertised on Facebook, Linked In, and X - The River Denys MacLennans, River Denys, Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia, Canada.

DUNCAN MACLENNAN

(1740 – 1828) Duncan MacLennan, the progenitor of the River Denys MacLennans was born in approximately 1740 in or around the village of Lochcarron on the western shore of the sea loch of the same name (Loch Carron), located in the Ross and Cromarty district of the Scottish Highlands.

Little is known of Duncan's life in Scotland. In approximately 1778 he married May MacDonald (1760-1780) and had two sons, Alexander (Sandy) (1779-?) and Donald (1780-1858). May died the same year that Donald was born. After a few years Duncan married Kate Matheson with whom he had four children, Martha (?-1874), Hugh (1796-1870), Dougald (1800-1873) and Iain Ruadh (Red John) (1802-1879). In 1821, at the age of 81, Duncan emigrated from Lochcarron with his four youngest children. It is unknown when his wife Kate passed away, but it was before the family emigrated.

The two oldest sons, Sandy and Donald, remained in Scotland. Boarding the ship Tamarlin in Plockton, the family is believed to have landed in Pictou, Nova Scotia, before making their way to Malagawatch on Cape Breton Island where they spent their first winter. Duncan's grandchild John (1821-1902), the son of Hugh and his wife Jessie Finlayson (1797-1883), was born there, and believed to be the first non-indigenous child born in the area. The family relocated to River Denys and settled along the north bank of the river where their descendants still reside.

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Duncan had hopes that his oldest sons would join him in River Denys, so he reserved 200 acres of land for them. He also reserved an additional 200 acres for a minister should one become available to the community. Duncan's eldest son, Sandy, joined the British army and remained in the United Kingdom. Nothing is known of Sandy once the rest of the family left Scotland. Duncan's second son, Donald, had become a tailor, with his wife Christine (1790-1861). Donald's pressing iron brought from Scotland is still in the family. Also a MacLennan from Attadale across the Loch from Lochcarron, emigrated in 1824 to join his father in River Denys.

Duncan's four sons that joined him in River Denys produced over 2,300 descendants (and counting!) who spread throughout Canada and the United States. Additional chapters detailing the families of Donald (Tailor), Hugh, Dougald, and Red John will follow in subsequent newsletters. Calling MacLennan descendants to Strathpeffer, Scotland

The storied origins of the Clan MacLennan focus on the area around the Five Sisters of Kintail – located in the West Coast mountains inland from Skye. The Clan became loyal supporters of the McKenzie (later "Seaforth") chiefs from the 1300s – including roles at their strategically located Donan's island (Eilean Donan), Kintail.

By the 1500s, the McKenzies, with McLennans and other supporters, had acquired the main route from west to east – through Strathconon, and, by 1630, controlled Lochalsh, Lochcarron, Applecross, Gairloch, the Isle of Lewis, and parts of the Black Isle. In the 1620s, the powerful Seaforths established their principal castle at Brahan near Strathpeffer.


The fort on Eilean Donan was destroyed by English forces in 1719 and would remain in ruin for over 200 years. The parts mentioned above are the main districts where MacLennans were to be found in earlier times.

I have gone to three Worldwide Mac/McLennan Scottish Gatherings and explored my husband's ancestral part of the Highlands and I can promise you it is the most wonderful experience of a lifetime.

Hoping to be reacquainted with many Clan friends and make new friends among the Clans this summer. See you at The Games!


From the President's Keyboard



Clan Ramsay DNA Project Update - DNA Doesn't Lie:

The 1st Quarter winner of the free DNA kit, one to be given away each quarter this year, was Nathan Graham Ramsay. Based upon some common family origins/migration paths, Nathan was believed to be closely related to member Mark B. Ramsey, as their families both came through Canada and New York. When results were returned, we learned some unexpected results. While both are in our close genetic family's E haplogroup, Na-than was shown to not share the mutation that Mark and my close genetic family share from around 1700, but he does share a common ancestor with our whole genetic family, likely from Maybole, Ayrshire, Scotland, from the mid to late 1600s. We will continue to look for potential genetic matches to this family, to tie together families from the US, UK, and Australia.

The 2nd Quarter winner, Jerry Ramsey, has submitted his test kit, and we are all waiting on his results. His line is recorded back to John Ramsay and Isobel Bell in Lanarkshire Scotland. This line does not appear to have been previously DNA tested, and many related members should benefit from the results.

Outside of the Clan Ramsay DNA committee, through my traditional genealogical research, I found Ryan Ram-say, who based upon family trees was thought to be related to several existing and former Clan members, including former and current members Celia Ramsay and Kyle Willis. I convinced Ryan to submit a DNA sample, and after receiving Ryan's results, it is now known that he is more closely related to others in the E-V13 haplogroup, including former Clan member William Ross Ramsay. This separates Ryan from the E-V22 haplogroup which he was previously thought to share a common ancestor, by hundreds, maybe thousands of years.

New member Billy Ramsey's family tree shows a line going all the way back to the Earl of Dalhousie, but the Ramsay/Ramsey database conflicts with his records, indicating there have been assumptions made to connect similar names among three to four family lines. At least three of these individual lines have been DNA tested, with results indicating haplogroups of E, I, and R, obviously not closely related. Billy is being considered for our 3rd Quarter DNA kit giveaway, but might not wait to submit a test kit on his own. I don't blame him for wanting to clear up the confusion. By comparing his DNA results with these previously tested individuals, we should be able to determine where mistakes were made.

DNA doesn't lie, and sometimes it tells a different story than we were hoping for. Even then, when we find out we were wrong, the knowledge gained helps everyone, as much, if not more than if it proves us right.

Clan Strachan Search For A Chief

The 31st July 2024 will be a momentous date for Clan Strachan. After nearly 200 years as an armigerous clan, the Court of the Lord Lyon is holding a Strachan Family Convention to recognise a new Chief of the Name and Arms. The last Strachan Chief, Adm. Sir Richard John Strachan, Bt., Representor of Thornton, died in 1828 without a male heir.

Charles Robert Lund (Rob) Strachan from the Mill of Strachan in the Village of Strachan, Kincardineshire, has served as Commander for the past ten years and is candidate for Chief.

The Family Convention will take place during the 2024 Clan Gathering. Events are planned from Sunday, 28th July, through to the Aboyne Highland Games on Saturday, 3rd August. Details on the Gathering are available at 2024 Strachan Family Convention (www.clanstrachan.org)

The first recorded use of Strachan (spelling broadly defined) is seen in a grant by King William to William Gifford between 1189x95 for the Barony of Strachan.

The first use as a territorial designation was by Ranulpho de Stratheuchin in c. 1212

By the mid-1200s, the Strachan family was closely allied with John Comyn, Earl of Buchan. In 1306, Robert de Bruce murdered Red Comyn at the altar of Greyfriars Abbey, at which time the Strachan Family actively took arms against the Bruce in the First War of Scottish Independence. In 1308, Castlehill of Strachan (near the present-day Village of Strachan) was burned and destroyed by forces loyal to Robert de Bruce.

The Strachan family was disinherited from the Barony of Strachan, but eventually reconciled with Robert de Bruce and were staunch supporters of his son, David II. Over the ensuing centuries, various Houses of Strachan acquired substantial estates in Scotland. However, each House eventually became extinct in the male line.

In 2005, a group of Clan enthusiasts in California formed the non-profit Clan Strachan Scottish Heritage Society, i.e., Clan Strachan Society, an organization that today includes clan members from many different countries, including Scotland, Canada, and Australia.

The Role of the Society is to act as liaison between the Clan Representor (Chief or Commander), including his Clan Council, and the various persons located throughout the world who fondly associate themselves with STRACHAN clans-people.

In 2014, Clan Strachan held a Family Convention in Scotland, under the jurisdiction of the Court of the Lord Lyon, to recognise Rob Strachan as Commander of the Clan. On 5 August 2014, a warrant was issued by the Lord Lyon to formalize this choice. In 2019, a large Clan Strachan Gathering was held in Scotland to strengthen clan identity. Again, in 2019, another warrant was issued to Rob Strachan as Commander.

The need for a clan geographic focal point was identified, to serve as a clan gathering place and to bring together the various scattered Strachan historical elements. Despite major obstacles to achieving this, in September 2020 Clan Strachan became one of the few Scottish Clans to acquire real property in their traditional ambit.

During the COVID pandemic, the Society and the Clan Strachan Trust conducted a campaign that raised sufficient funds to acquire the Feughside Inn, in the Village of Strachan, Kincardineshire. The 2024 Family Convention will be held there. A second fundraiser has allowed the Clan to begin the establishment of a Clan Strachan Centre for Heritage at the Feughside.

A Final Note: Individuals wishing to put themselves forward as a candidate for Commander or Chief of Clan Strachan, at the up-coming Family Convention, are encouraged to come forward before July 31, 2024. A candidate must bear the surname alone and must be proposed and seconded by a Strachan authorised to attend the Family Convention. Self-nomination is permitted. This does not mean a new candidate might be appointed Chief immediately.

If a new candidate emerges, the Lord Lyon may insist they serve for a period as Commander.

Strachans, or those who bear affection to the Name, are invited to attend or observe the proceedings.

Be sure to notify the <u>Strachan Society</u> as soon as possible. The convention's decision is subject to the Lord Lyon's approval. The Clan Strachan Society cannot favour any candidate.






