From the Chair:

"Inaction breeds doubt and fear. Action breeds confidence and courage. If you want to conquer fear, do not sit home and think about it. Go out and get busy." — Dale Carnegie

It is of little surprise to me that one of the pioneers in the field of self-improvement, public speaking and interpersonal skills was of Scottish heritage. A little research revealed that Dale Carnegie was born Dale Harbison Carnagey, his surname an altered form of "Carnegie", a Scottish surname derived from a place called Carnegie near Carmyllie in Angus, Scotland . The Carnegie family name has deep roots in Scottish history, with the earliest records tracing back to the 14th century. The family was associated with the barony of Carnegie in Angus



and has been linked to notable Scottish nobility, including the Earls of Southesk and Northesk.

Most of us know Dale Carnegie as the author of the seminal book "How to Win Friends and Influence People" which remains a foundational work in the self-help genre.

Look deep into anything that underpins our civilization today and you'll eventually find a Scot!

It is likely of no surprise to you that I'm all in for the 'do something' approach especially combined with the positive side of what is clinically called Magical Thinking. "Magical thinking means that a person believes their thoughts, feelings, or rituals can influence events in the material world, either intentionally or unintentionally." Leverage magical thinking by extending the belief to include actions and you gain the superpower of constructive confidence, optimism and staying power in what you set out to accomplish.

Spring General Assembly Results

This is how we should view the work done by your Board of Directors in achieving the results of the Spring General Assembly where members passed the Special Resolution to amend our articles of incorporation and massively revise our bylaws. Not unanimous but with 97% approval. There was 1 vote opposed with no reason or rationale given for why? Corporations Canada and the Canada Revenue Agency very quickly approved the requested changes.

The results of the Spring General Assembly was in sharp contrast to what happened at the November AGM. After the November meeting, your Board felt that it had been ambushed by what we now understand started with a procedural mistake in allowing a motion to table. Such a motion, even when made for the right reasons, should only be allowed once discussion on the matter at hand was completed. Procedural error, confused members and directors plus poor vote count recording meant that it did not end well. However we moved on and are now working on policies and tactics to avoid 'ambushes' and mistakes in the future.

The Spring General Assembly finished with a presentation title "Hands-On AI: Learn, Apply, Succeed". The session may be watched in its entirety using the link: https://youtu.be/zCeBvy0MF00 A checklist and query template is provided on the next page.

In brief, the changes in our articles mean that we are now 'Scots of Canada' and can have voting and non -voting memberships. More details on how the membership classes work along with other significant

Scots of Canada - Understanding the Changes

The adoption of revised articles of incorporation and a complete replacement of bylaws occurred at the Spring General Assembly on April 13th. There were 38 member group represented by Zoom attendees and by proxy.

A straight-forward change in the articles was the name becoming Scots of Canada. To ensure that we did not have any impediment to using a new name, our legal team asked Corporations Canada to pre-approve our first choice, Scots Canada. They said no, that is was too close and confusing to the Scotts Canada registrations for lawn care products.

So we adjusted and instead asked for pre-approval of Scots of Canada which was accepted.

Beyond the name change, the articles were changed to allow for multiple membership classes with different voting rights. One with voting rights and the other without voting rights. The implementation of the actual voting classes was left to be defined in the bylaws.

A word of caution to those dealing with article and/or bylaw changes. Less is best. Keeping as much verbiage as possible out of your articles and bylaws helps with minimizing the inevitable internal conflicts and areas of mis-interpretation that can cause grief in the future. Plus it helps avoid needing full membership approval for correcting silly things like in our early bylaws of requiring explicit director approval for each Zoom meeting or quorum for a members meeting being set at 3 members! Don't repeat what you don't need to between your articles and bylaws.

An important principle in the changes to the articles was to leave as much as possible to the implementation of the articles through the bylaws. An equally important principle in the bylaws was to leave as much as possible to implementation in the policies and procedures which the existence and use of were made mandatory.

Our original plan for the bylaws, even back in November, was to modify what we already had to suit what we needed for the new membership classes and to clean up what effectively was nonsense inherited and copied in the past. It became quickly obvious that the colloquial idiom "You can't get there from here" was the situation with just revising the old bylaws. So we started from scratch with a fresh set from a government tool and then worked over a period of three months to adapt them to our unique needs. This took a huge amount of your board's personal time and a significant legal expense to achieve.

What it means

We now have a name that properly reflects the current membership and is totally suited to the new memberships we'll be accepting. The previous name was not inclusive of all our festivals, games, museums, enterprises and was totally at odds with the new type of membership. The new name has instant recognizability of what we are about.

Now we have 3 sub-classes of membership.


- 1. **Organization Member:** This is the original membership class in Clans and Scottish Societies of Canada. Organization members have a vote which they will exercise through a representative such as their Delegate.
- 2. **Household Member:** A new membership class that is based upon individuals having kinship living at the same postal address. Each **Household Member** does not have a vote at meetings of members but will have a representative who are key to the process of electing **Household Delegates**.
- 3. **Household Delegate**: Who are elected by the household representatives. **Household Delegates** will have a vote at meetings of members.

The way in which representation occurs for the **household members** is not new at all. In our democracies, we elect a member of parliament for instance as our 'delegate'. For our **organization members**, their own individual members are represented by a delegate and how this delegate is chosen is up to the organization. We've implemented a blend of these with how **household members** are represented.

There will be strict rules for **Household Delegates.** They must attend the member meeting in order to keep their position. They may not use a proxy. They should come from the pool of household representatives and they may not be acting in any form of leadership, executive or chief-ship for what would be a candidate or existing organization membership.

In deciding on the **Household Member** class, we looked at the options of individual and/or family memberships. What we concluded was that having one or both for an organization seemed to be more driven by a revenue/value perspective than by what was really of importance in achieving an organization's objectives. It would have added levels of complexity while doing little to improve a broader sense of belonging and sustainability. As a household, all those of kinship can participate in the many ways that we can extend the benefits of membership to them. Also to help with sustainability is that memberships are now **perpetual** and only have a status of **active** (paid up) or **inactive** (not paid up) which affects benefits.

The three sub-classes of membership are shown as green boxes in the diagram below which also shows another change. That of officers being now appointed by the Board of Directors instead of being elected annually at an AGM. Term limits are being implemented for directors and officers as part of this change.





Clan Buchanan - GED Match, A DNA Tool for Genealogy



Clan Buchanan Society International (CBSI) shares their latest genealogical project using GEDmatch. University lecturer Kim Tuovinen notes that "One of the things that attracts a lot of people to engage with their Clan societies is the hope that they'll be able to make more sense of their family trees."

However, "yDNA, which is passed down the male line on the 23rd chromosome, only tracks paternal ancestry: it is unable to show relationships between descendants along mixed male-female lines. For that, autosomal DNA is required."

In the April 2025 edition of the Buchanan Banner newsletter, Mr. Tuovinen provides the details of a new DNA project focusing on autosomal DNA through the online service GEDmatch. So far, CBSI has a total of 40 participating users who have uploaded a total of 71 test kits.

Mr. Tuovinen steps through the analysis of how a member of the project can use the free tools provided by GEDMatch by using the "Segment Analysis" tool to find relatives. Once you have taken these specific steps, "You will then be taken to a results page which shows 'how close' your matches are to you (cM) on all chromosomes; the starting and ending positions of any matching segments of DNA, the cM distance on each chromosome, together with how much overlap exists between those matching segments.

If you selected the sort option 'Most Recent Common Ancestor', the kits at the top of your search results should belong the person whom GEDMatch estimates most recently shares a common ancestor with you."

He admits that GEDMatch does represent a learning curve, but he believes that it's one of the most accessible tools for drilling into autosomal.

Ancestral Homes

The term 'ancestral home' can mean different things to different people, but generally it refers to the place where your grandparents or great-grandparents lived or where your family lived for generations. Here in Ireland, there are ruins of small houses scattered everywhere in the countryside where I live, and to be honest, most people pass little remarks of them unless they are linked to their family. Over the last few years, I started to look around and think... "Who lived there?" ...because at one stage they were all family homes like our homes today. I have found that many databases of houses exist, but they are usually for prominent families in an area and so-called 'big houses', and whilst this is all very important to record in detail too, we are missing a lot of the history from all the smaller homes that existed in every townland of the country! This is also true for many other countries, usually these histories of 'ordinary' people being passed down within families, usually through oral means, but really having no archive to call home.

Through genealogical research I came into contact with a remarkable man, originally from my area but now living in Canada, named Philip Donnelly, and thus I became involved in his new project, the free-to-use and not-for-profit Ancestral Homes Network (www.ancestralhomes.net), that allows anybody to record the history of any house anywhere around the globe. The network's aim is to grow the website into what would eventually become an International Archive of Ancestral Homes, so that no matter who you are or where you are, you could search on the website, find your ancestral home and learn all about your roots. For this to happen, we need participation from everybody possible to record as many homes as possible and ce-

ment your family's history in this archive for future generations to learn about and perhaps visit the place their family once called home.

I've been involved as a director since around the website's inception in late 2020, early 2021 and it is a project I have high hopes for, as I believe it could become a hugely important database in the future. Useful for anybody from professional researchers to everyday people just wanting to record their family's history, you can:

- Upload images of the house
- Show its location on an integrated world map
- Add lists of residents and biographies
- List architectural details of the house and other facts
- List key events that happened in the home, or dates of renovations
- Link census records for the house
- Ability to upload PDF documents to add more information and stories
- List source websites for your information

So, please, I encourage you, record your family and their ancestral homes today, I look forward to reading all about them!

Clan Bell North America

Proposals and paraphrases on an original journalistic article.

Every story has a beginning. This one begins with a chance encounter at the Bibliotheca Bipontina.

Sir Knight Frater Robert A. Bels, of feudal nobility, Dr. h.c. of the Imperial Dynasty of Hohenstaufen und Derneck (2003), had come to the princely library to research his family history. Particularly the Scottish line.

Barbara Sittinger, from the RHEINPFALZ newspaper, spoke to the Flanders-born nobleman, who has lived in Zweibrücken since 2012. The knight's roots go back a long way.


A little taste of history: the seat of his lineage, the Seigneurs de Balliol (Bailleul), was only 90 km from that of the Seigneurs "van Boonen" - "de Boulognes", the town with which Zweibrücken is celebrating its 65th anniversary of twinning this year.

In addition to the family ties between these two great Flanders lineages, there are those of joint cavalcades: during the Battle of Hastings (1066), led by William the Conqueror and under the banner of Count Eustace de Boulognes, and the first Crusade to the Holy Land (1099), under the banner of Godfrey de Bouillon, Duke of Lotharingia, son of Count Eustace de Boulognes.

The knight, Belgian by birth, comes from a large family of feudal nobility, some of whose surnames originated in the Flemish town of "Balliol" or "Belle", in the year 960. The surname "Balliol" became Bailleul following annexation by France in 1678, under the Treaty of Nijmegen.

Other surnames, such as "Bels", "Belle", "Bayles", etc., go back much further in time. They are different

forms of the archaic German genitive that formed the basis of the "Diets" language of yesteryear, today's Flemish.

"Our family spread throughout Europe from Flanders. Today, Bels can be found all over Europe.

Their surnames have been adopted and modified according to the language and spelling of the countries where they originated. They are mainly to be found in Flanders, France, Spain, England and Scotland," says the 78-year-old "young man".

Clan of the Bells



Traces of the various lineages that make up the Dynasty abound in England and Scotland. In Scotland, members of his family were Regent of Scotland (Jean de Balliol), King of Scotland (Jean II Balliol) and King of Scotland (Edouard I Balliol), towards the end of the 13th century. This Balliol line took possession of their lands following the conquest of England by William the Conqueror in 1066.

Going back in time, one of his "Bels" ancestors can be found in a trial file dating back to 1014, where as a lawyer, he defended the Count of Barcelona, Guillaume de Montcada, in a legal dispute with the vicar of Olesa. Other ancestors are mentioned in 879, when the Count of Barcelona Wilfredo "el Velloso" married Winidilde de Flandres, daughter of the Count of Flanders, and in 843, when a "Bels" is mentioned as a signatory in the rare documents relating to the "Treaty of Verdun" or "Yutz".

Even localities in the Pyrenees bear variants of the family name. They date back to the times of Charlemagne and the "Reconquista" in the early 8th century. Traces of this lineage go even further back in time, since a handful of Flemish knights, including dynasts, are said to have ensured the safety of the Merovingian king Dagobert II, on his return from exile in England, and on his way to Rennes-le-Château, in the foothills of the Pyrenees, where he married the Visigoth princess Giselle du Razès in 718.

Bels" and other surname variants were also instrumental in the nascent Merovingian administrations (late 5th century), in their first capitals Thérouanne (40km from Balliol and Ypres) and Tournai (50 km). There, they served as administrative officials. To avoid stirring up controversy about the very great antiquity of his lineage, the knight prefers to add the term "multisecular cognationes" to his coat of arms, instead of dates.

The fact that the Chevalier is a perfect polyglot, having learned Latin, French, English, German, Russian, Dutch and, as a dilettante, the hieroglyphs of the Middle Kingdom, was a great help to his historical research.

"Researching the history of our lineage's patronymic variants, found in a multitude of works spread across a plethora of libraries, is very demanding, time-consuming and costly work", according to the Chevalier.

This ability in foreign languages has not only enabled him to discover the world of his ancestors but has also served him well in his professional career. From 1976 to 2002, he was attached to the NATO Headquarters at Ramstein Air Force Base. He has lived in Zweibrücken since 2011.

Le Chevalier Bels has always been interested in medieval history and ancient civilizations. Although he was not trained as a historian. But the story doesn't stop there. Our Chevalier is also a musician, painter, writer and philosopher. More discreetly, he is also Grand Master of the Ordo Balliolensis (OB).




Detail from the charter of Malcolm IV, King of Scotland to Kelso Abbey showing an illustration of David I, King of Scotland.

Course Overview

This course will provide an introduction to speaking and singing in Gaelic, the Celtic language of Scotland. Students will learn pronunciation, basic vocabulary and useful phrases. Music is an effective tool for learning language. Each class will explore a different type of traditional song from Scotland's rich Gaelic heritage.

Students will encounter a range of songs and styles and understand the cultural context behind them. Musical styles will include mouth music, waulking and other work songs, children's and ceilidh songs, songs of love and loss, and traditional Gaelic psalm-singing.

Method of Teaching

Instruction will include a mix of lecture-style delivery of information on the history, sound patterns and musical genres in addition to opportunities for students to interact with each other to practice simple conversation exercises and participate in group singing. There will be in-class use of multimedia resources including audio and video recordings as well as printed text. While not required, self-directed study will be encouraged, with students practicing their singing and newly developed language skills or accessing on-line supports between sessions to reinforce learning. No prior knowledge of Gaelic or ability to read music are required.

Guarding Trust: AI, Privacy & Data Sovereignty in Uncertain Times



Crossing Borders, Guarding Trust: AI, Data Sovereignty, and Donor Privacy in Uncertain Times

As Canadian charities and not-for-profits (NFPs) increasingly adopt AI and cloud-based technologies, a critical question emerges: where is our data located, and who controls it? Recent shifts in U.S. political dynamics, especially under the second presidency of Donald Trump, have reignited concerns about civil society surveillance, politicization of data access, and cross-border data transfers. For organizations that steward sensitive donor, volunteer, and program participant information, these developments demand a sober reexamination of compliance, sovereignty, and trust.

Data sovereignty refers to the principle that data is subject to the laws and governance structures of the country in which it is collected or stored. In Canada, this is primarily shaped by the Personal Information Protection and Electronic Documents Act (PIPEDA), which regulates private-sector data use, as well as provincial statutes like Quebec's Law 25 (formerly Bill 64), Alberta's Personal Information Protection Act (PIPA), and British Columbia's Personal Information Protection Act (BC PIPA).

These laws require transparency, consent, and accountability in handling personal information, but also allow for international data transfers, provided adequate protections are in place. However, what is "adequate" becomes murkier when foreign governments may assert jurisdictional claims over cloudstored or algorithmically processed data, particularly under extraterritorial legislation like the U.S. Clarifying Lawful Overseas Use of Data Act ("CLOUD Act").

Canada's reliance on U.S.-based cloud providers means that much of the country's data is hosted across the border or subject to U.S. jurisdiction. Under the CLOUD Act, U.S. authorities may compel disclosure of data from American companies – even if the data is physically stored in Canada – raising legitimate worries about state surveillance, especially of organizations engaged in advocacy, immigration, or human rights work.

It is becoming increasingly critical to consider what AI-enabled surveillance could mean for donor anonymity, freedom of association, and protection from political profiling. With AI models trained on massive datasets, including those harvested through partnerships with U.S. platforms, there is a risk of inadvertent exposure of personal data, even when explicit identifiers are removed. To address this risk, organizations should have a comprehensive AI policy, as discussed in the October 2024 Charity & NFP Law AI Update.

The Canadian federal government has recognized the urgency of establishing "AI sovereignty" through its Canadian Sovereign AI Compute Strategy and related Sovereign Compute Infrastructure Program. These initiatives aim to invest in domestic AI infrastructure that aligns with Canadian values, privacy protections, and democratic accountability. These programs underscore the growing philosophical shift in Canada from "data privacy" to "data sovereignty" – a recognition that control, not just protection, is at the heart of ethical data governance.

For Canadian organizations navigating this new landscape, several steps can help ensure data remains sovereign and privacy-compliant:

Review Cross-Border Data Flows

Conduct a data mapping exercise to identify where donor and constituent data is stored and processed.

Work with IT providers to ensure that data residency options (e.g., Canadian-based data centres) are enabled and documented.

Scrutinize AI Vendors and Tools

Examine whether any AI-based fundraising, outreach, or analytics tools use U.S. or third-country infrastructure.

Seek out Canadian or open-source alternatives when possible, or demand contractual guarantees regarding data localization and non-use for secondary purposes, though the latter option may still lead to the possibility of the data being accessed by the U.S. government via the CLOUD Act, if the vendor is an American based company.

Update Privacy Policies and Contracts

Revise consent language to reflect transparency about AI use and potential international transfers.

Review vendor agreements to ensure compliance with PIPEDA or provincial law. Implement Role-Based Access and Encryption

Limit access to sensitive donor or beneficiary data to personnel with a direct need to know.

Encrypt data in transit and at rest, especially where data is stored on servers outside of Canada.

Train Staff on AI Risks

Provide regular training on ethical AI usage and privacy compliance.

Emphasize the heightened risks of using free or opaque tools that may scrape or profile donor behavior.

In this time of geopolitical volatility and rapid technological evolution, data governance is no longer just a back-office function, but a board-level issue that intersects with mission integrity, public trust, and compliance. Canadian charities and NFPs must affirm their role not only as stewards of donations but as guardians of privacy.

By making sovereignty-conscious choices about where and how data is stored and analyzed, organizations can protect their communities, maintain donor confidence, and stand firm in the values that underpin the sector.

In brief, Days 1 and 2 will be presentations, interspersed with Q & A sessions, and will take place at Lews Castle. Day 3 will be Tours (of which there will be 3 options). Online attendance is possible for Days 1 & 2, but Day 3 is only open to in-person delegates. Please note that if you are not booking for the full conference you will need to book each day separately.

This event is being organised by Museum & Tasglann nan Eilean, part of Comhairle nan Eilean Siar's Heritage and Culture Team, and will consider the theme of Outer Hebrides emigration from a range of perspectives. The conference will consist of a mix of in-person and online speakers.

The conference programme offers a wide and varied consideration of emigration – a subject so significant to the history of the islands. The first two days of the conference will feature a series of academic speakers from Scotland, Canada and the USA. Subjects covered will include chain migration, state directed colonisation, forced child migration, ancestral tourism and the artistic portrayal of emigration.

Some presentations will be through the medium of Gaelic with simultaneous translation for in-person delegates. This will include 'Gaelic language and culture in Nova Scotia: a'coimhead air n-ais, is a' coimhead air adhart' and 'S e Crìoch Gach Comunn Dealachadh: Contextualising the experiences of the emigrant Gael through their poetry and song'.

Other subjects discussed will be the living traditions carried through language, culture and music, today's understanding of the effect of migration on human psychology and relationships with the Peoples whose lands were settled.

The keynote address will be delivered by University of Aberdeen Professor Marjory Harper who is also a renowned author of several books on the subject of Scottish diaspora and emigration.

We are delighted that three academics from the University of Alberta, whose research is focused on the fur trade, have received funding to attend the conference in person. We look forward to welcoming them to the Outer Hebrides and exchanging ideas and research.

The cost for those attending in person will be £60 (including VAT) for the Full Conference, or a daily rate of £24 per day (including VAT). This includes tea/ coffee/ lunch and an Evening Reception on Day 1. There is an option for online attendance at a reduced cost.

As well as the conference, we are also having an Emigration Exhibition at each of our museums this year as part of Hebridean Homecoming 2023-25. We hope that both the Conference and the Exhibitions will be of interest to you and the members of your society/ organisation.


NBSCA , Annual General Meeting , Fredericton , October 4th . This year the meeting will be hosted by the Fredericton Society of St .Andrews .

As we become more engaged with various forms of media, we need to set boundaries for acceptability when content affects our fellow members and the public as a whole, particularly regarding what reflects on **Scots of Canada** as an organization. **Scots of Canada** is an organization formed to promote Scottish culture and heritage.

Here are guidelines to help with this:

- No media content is allowed that violates the terms of membership as set out in the bylaws, specifically regarding the making of false statements, defamation, intimidation, or the attribution of false or defamatory statements, or any dissemination of misinformation or unsubstantiated information specifically meant to bring disrepute to an individual or group.
- No media content is allowed that promotes the violation of intellectual property and copyright laws or that lessens respect for the laws and standards of heraldry in Canada and internationally.

About Scots of Canada

Founded in 1976 as Clans and Scottish Societies of Canada, our purpose is:

To advance Scottish Cultural Heritage in Canada, such Scottish culture be defined to include, but not be restricted to, traditional Highland, Island and Lowland cultures, whether in Scotland, Canada or wherever Scottish Culture may be expressed;

To foster the organization of and co-operation and communication between Scottish federations, clans, societies or groups through the initiation and co-ordination of projects and undertakings;
